### TOURNEY HERE

#### MINIKAHDA CLUB MAY ENTER-TAIN TRANS-MISSISSIPPI ASS'N.

Play Has Been in Progress for a Fort-night on Temporary Greens at Both Minikahda and Bryn Mawr Links—Greens in Unusually Good Condition.

In spite of the backwardness of the season, local golfers have been out on the links for two weeks past—quite as soon, in fact, as the snow left the ground. At the Minikahda and Bryn Mawr courses play has been in progress every day on the temporary greens, the players have been confined to the most enthusiastic of the club members.

The links have dried out remarkably fast, and play upon the permanent greens will begin earlier than has been expected the last two seasons. At the Minikahda club the turf is in unusually good condition, entirely free from the bare spots which commonly trouble the links of the north in the spring. The permanent greens at both clubs will be in use by May 15, or even earlier if the weather is favorable.

Interest in the sport has been stimulated this year by the proposal to hold the annual tournament of the Trans-Mississippi Golf association on the links of the Minikahda club. The latter organization has only recently become a member of the Trans-Mississippi association, but informal assurance has been given that the club can have the tournament if it desires. The matter will probably be decided in the next few days.

The Trans-Mississippi Golf association includes in its membership clubs in Iowa, Nebraska, Colorado and other western states as far west as San Francisco. The tournament would probably draw a hundred golfers from outside the state to Minneapolis and would be the biggest event in golfing circles which has ever taken place in this city.

The Minikahda club is preparing a strong schedule of club matches for the season. The regular monthly matches with the Town and Country club will undoubtedly be a feature of the season. Matches with the Bryn Mawr club, the Lafayette club, the Meadowbrook of Winoka and the Fairbault club, with possibly a match with a Chicago or Milwaukee team, will complete the list. The contests for the various club cups will be begun in June.

The Bryn Mawr club expects to have the strongest team in its history this year, owing to the development of a large number of young players who are improving rapidly with each season's play. The club will arrange matches with all the other strong organizations of the state. The state golf tournament, which will be held this summer on the links of the Meadowbrook club at Winoka, will attract a large entry list, as usual.
