FIREBUG BUSY AT ABERDEEN, S. D.

Second Thresher Warehouse of John McCarthy & Son Burned—Loss \$5,000.

Aberdeen, S. D., May 4.—An incendiary fire early this morning destroyed the second thresher warehouse of John McCarthy & Son, with a loss of \$5,000; insurance \$3,000. The building was a mere shell and the loss will amount to little thereon. Five traction engines, three threshing machines and a large number of wagons, seeders and drills were burned up. If the engines are damaged beyond repair the loss will be much heavier than above stated. The barn of J. J. McCaughey in the residence section was set on fire earlier in the night and the department was there when the McCarthy fire started. Since the for-

mer McCarthy warehouse fire, a month ago, Pinkerton men have been here, but went home a few days ago and Monday night a dozen special plain-clothes men, who have been on duty nights, were laid off. The fire immediately followed, making it evident that the fire bug knows everything that is going on towards trying to locate him.

ANOTHER NEW TOWNSITE It Is Probably to Be Settled Mainly by Finns.

CASS LAKE, MINN.—An application has been made at the local United States land office for the establishment of another new townsite on the late Chippewa reservation. The application is being made under the provisions of the town site law of Feb. 9, 1902, and the location of the new town is in township 148-27 and 28. There are at the present time a colony of Finns, who recently arrived there, numbering over 200. They are taking claims in the vicinity of the proposed new town, and there is every indication that the community will make a thriving place. Primarily interested in the entry of the new town are Judge Frank Ives, proprietor of the Cass Lake Times, his foreman, G. F. Lee, and J. Torina, who are acting in conjunction with others, as required by the provisions of the town-site law.

Contesting Hearst and Anti-Hearst Delegations Seem Certain.


New York Sun Special Service. Des Moines, Iowa, May 4.—On the eve of the democratic state convention it seems certain that Iowa will send contesting delegations to St. Louis. Hawkeye democrats are overflowing the city, the fight having aroused unparalleled interest. The convention preliminaries began last night with a mass meeting in the interest of William R. Hearst in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium. There will be a fight from the minute the chairman of the state central committee raps for order, and hints dropped by the leaders of the two factions, Hearst and anti-Hearst, are significant of what either side will do if the other gets control.

SUIT TO RECOVER ON \$1,600 DRAFT

It May Bring to the Surface Some Interesting Insurance Facts.

Crookston, Minn., May 4.—The Scandia-American bank of this city has started a suit to recover on a draft of \$1,600 issued by the Commercial Mutual and on which payment was stopped. The draft was cashed by the bank from one A. Maha, who formerly conducted a store at Pisek, N. D. A fire started in Maha's store some time in January and burned up the greater portion of the town. Maha carried \$2,000 each in the Merchants' Mutual and the North Dakota of Valley City, \$1,600 each in the Implement Dealers' Association and Commercial Mutual. Apparently the loss was a total one and an adjustment was made for the full amount. The Commercial Mutual and the Merchants' Mutual settled their losses with 60-day drafts. Maha moved to Iowa and shortly after his departure the companies were advised that there was something peculiar about the origin of the fire and the part that Maha played in them. A detective was assigned to the case and he found that shortly before the fire Maha had shipped several trucks filled with different kinds of merchandise to Iowa, and immediately after the fire he had shipped others. The detectives worked several weeks on the case and the result was that the Commercial Mutual notified the up-country bank that they had stopped payment on the draft. Maha was advised and he promptly paid up the amount that he raised on the draft and took it up. The Commercial Mutual contends the Scandia-American is not an innocent purchaser in the eyes of the law, and will claim that they have sufficient proof to show that Maha was making an effort to defraud the insurance companies carrying risks on his Pisek property. The insurance company will not give up without a fight and the trial may bring out some interesting facts in regard to the fire.

600 MILES OF NEW LINE THIS YEAR

This is the Promise of the Canadian Northern Railway Construction Officials.

Winnipeg, Man., May 4.—"The construction work we have outlined for this season," said William Mackenzie, president of the Canadian Northern railway, to your representative this morning, "includes the completion, or as much of it as possible, on the line to Edmonton which is now finished to Kamsack, where a divisional point has been established; the line to Prince Albert, a distance of sixty miles from Kamsack, and the line to Regina, also the line from Carberry to Brandon, Arizona, Man., to Carberry, the Greenway and Ridgeway branches, the line from Winnipeg to Oak Point, Lake Manitoba and the Cianwilman extension.

We will probably grade from both the east and west end of the line to Edmonton and will make an effort to reach that town by next winter, but at present we are not certain that we can accomplish this. The Prince Albert branch will be pushed to completion at once, but the bridge which has to be erected over the South Saskatchewan, fifteen miles east of Prince Albert, will not likely be built until next winter, so that it will be some time before our towns reach that thriving northern center.

The new mileage which we shall add to our system this year will be six hundred and thirty miles if it is a late fall it will reach the 700 mark. "We also hope to have a line in operation to Nelson river in the near future, but this will follow the completion of our lines in Manitoba and the west."

HEARST MEN NAMED TO GO TO ST. LOUIS

Des Moines, Iowa, May 4.—W. R. Hearst scored a victory in the district caucuses preliminary to the state democratic convention to-day by securing six districts against five for the anti-Hearst faction. The anti-Hearst were successful in the first, second, third, fourth and fifth. The Hearst men controlled the sixth, seventh, eighth, ninth, tenth and eleventh.
