MINNETONKA CLUB MAKES ITS PLANS

EXPECTS TO FILL HOTEL ST. LOUIS FOR SUMMER.

Club Is Having Building Thoroughly Renovated for Its Use as Clubhouse This Summer, and Announces a Special Summer Membership Rate—Special Advantages to Automobileists.

Having taken the Hotel St. Louis for the summer, the Minnetonka club has formulated plans for making the place popular this season. The building has been thoroughly renovated and will be opened Saturday, May 23. Chaplain of Actors' Church Alliance Holds a Service.

As chaplain of the Actors' Church Alliance, Rev. G. L. Morrill conducted a memorial service at the People's church, Masonic Temple yesterday afternoon, for Mrs. Ethel Taylor, who died in Milwaukee last week. The members of the Trans-Atlantic Burlesque company, of which she had been the leading lady for years, were present. The speaker referred to life as a stage on which men and women were actors, and God has assigned the parts. The actors were not to be faithful until death rung down the curtain, and they heard heavenly plaudits, "Well done." Such was the faithful career of the deceased. True to her husband, and devoted to her art, the world was brighter because she had lived in it. Mentally and morally, she was a credit to her profession. She was mourned not only by her husband, but by all the company, which felt that in her death, it had lost a kind and helpful companion. Continuing, Mr. Morrill said: "This world is no blot or blank, and there is much to enjoy. The theater has its mission to cheer care, lighten labor, recreate, and amuse. The Methodist General Conference would do well to remove its indiscriminate prohibition of theater attendance. It is time we remembered comedy has its place as well as tragedy. Vaudeville is often as virtuous and less vicious than more pretentious plays. Proportionately, there are as many good people on the stage as off, and their lives average as well. We are all members of the same family. God is our common father. The stage needs to be spiritualized, and the church humanized."

HOME FROM THE ORIENT

JUDGE M. B. KOON AND L. S. GILLETTE RETURN FROM A LONG TOUR ACROSS THE PACIFIC.

Judge M. B. Koon and Lewis S. Gillette returned to Minneapolis yesterday after a four months' tour in the Philippines, China and Japan. A part of the voyage was made in company with John S. Pillsbury and J. B. Gillett, Jr., whom they met in San Francisco, outward bound. Mr. Pillsbury and Mr. Gillette will not be back for several weeks. Judge Koon said that thruout the far east the absorbing topic of interest was the war, but that more was known of the operations in the United States than in Tokio, because of the strict censorship there. The lauded patriotism of the Japanese, he said, was not overestimated, for every Jap is filled with love of his country and is being awake to the importance of the war to Japan, is ready to do any service in its defense. The feeling toward the Americans here, he found, was friendly, and he was certain that if American manufacturers were aggressive and careful to supply exactly what the Japanese want, there was no question that they could capture the bulk of the trade there and in other parts of the orient.

FOUR BIG FORK

Cruisers Will Inspect State Timber to the Boundary. Four special cruisers will be sent out by State Auditor Iverson to tour the Big Fork valley in Itasca county and check up the timber standing on state land in that new country. The crew will consist of D. E. Elliott of Stillwater, Lafayette Shaw of St. Paul, Charles Olson of Taylors Falls and T. L. Duncan of Northome. They will start out this week from Deer River and work northward down the Big Fork to the Canadian line, taking in a strip four townships wide. The work will take about three months.

Will Deepen Ditch. The state drainage board has returned from Aitkin county, where it inspected the new state ditch. The work was approved, and it was decided to deepen about two miles of it to the extent of two feet. The contract was let to Mr.

Falconer of Aitkin for 15 cents a cubic yard.

AVALANCHE STRIKES SWISS MOUNTAIN TOWNS

Zermatt, Switzerland, May 16.—An immense avalanche fell recently from the Spitzhorn mountain, near Biga. After many days of hard work fourteen bodies have been recovered. The avalanche covered 7,000,000 cubic yards, and its movement was so rapid that the wind raised by it carried a woman 300 feet. Many of the victims died of asphyxia without a scratch. Enormous avalanches also fell on Mount St. Gothard. The river Reuss is choked by ice and snow, and a whole forest was razed. At Andermatt, where an avalanche fell close to the houses, twenty feet of snow is on the ground. The inhabitants of Reap and Zumtorf are in a state of terror, as other avalanches are expected.

ICEHOUSE BURNED

Northern Pacific Sustains a Loss of About \$2,500 at Billings.

Billings, Mont., May 16.—One of the largest icehouses of the Northern Pacific in this city was almost totally destroyed by fire, entailing a loss of about \$2,500. Sparks from an engine are believed to have started the blaze. The hardware men of eastern Montana, about fifty in number, held a convention in Billings and an organization was perfected to afford protection for the common interests. A banquet was held. This movement of the hardware men had its inception several months ago when their employees began the organizations of unions in various towns of the state.
