MINES CLOSE BECAUSE OF TIEUP ON THE LAKES

Iron Mountain, Mich., May 16.—Temporary curtailments are being made at the mine here and along the range, owing to lack of stockpile room, due to the tieup of the ore carriers on the lakes, and business is suffering greatly in consequence.

The Loretto mine at Loretto has been closed and the Pewabic here let out over sixty men to-day, continuing to mine only the best grades of ore. The Chapin, one of the largest iron mines in the world, is said to be about ready to curtail.

So strictly is the Sunday saloon closing law being enforced here that five saloonkeepers have taken the first step toward organizing a local association. A meeting was held to ascertain if the present attitude of the law is to be continued, the association threatening to close up all places of business on Sunday.

At a joint meeting held at the council chambers, the mayor replied that it was his intention to see that the laws are obeyed and that any retaliatory measures on the part of the saloonkeepers will result in making their position more unpleasant.

COLLEGE REMOVAL
Important Issues Before Augustana Conference at St. Peter.

St. Peter, Minn., May 16.—The Minnesota conference of the Augustana synod will convene in this city to-morrow evening and will be formally opened by the president, Dr. Freming. Many questions will come up for discussion and settlement, the most important of which are the election of a president for Gustavus Adolphus college and the removal of the college to the twin cities.

It is impossible at this time to predict the result of either question. As for the first, each one of the three candidates has his friends within the conference, and unless some of them withdraw, there will be a hard fight. As for the second, both sides feel confident of success. A great deal has been done in both places to gather funds and the question will be argued along the line of expediency.

ATHLETICS NOT RECOGNIZED

Iowa City Board of Education Has Pronounced Views.

Iowa City, May 16.—Grief reigns in the Iowa City high school, as the board of education has decided that the high school athletes must not enter the interscholastic meet in this city on May 20, as accredited representatives of the high school.

The board will not forbid the athletes to participate as individuals, but they are forbidden to call themselves the I. C. H. S. team, or otherwise seek to indicate that they have the board's sanction of athletic participation. The directors have not recognized a team for several years, alleging that scholarship is kept in the background proportionately to the advancement of athletics in the institution.
