CITY NEWS.

PRIZES FOR FINE CATTLE

WILL BRING OUT BIG EXHIBIT AT STATE FAIR—WHAT THE PREMIUM LIST OFFERS.

The cattle department has always been the strongest feature of the Minnesota state fair and in late years has become proportionately more conspicuous thru the holding of national cattle exhibits by the leading breeders' associations. For the fair of 1904 which opens this year on Aug. 25, the cattle division will be made stronger than heretofore. The American Hereford Breeders' association and the American Shorthorn Breeders' association will give national exhibits and will also conduct auction sales. These two great associations join with the Minnesota State Agricultural society in offering enormous premiums for cattle of their respective breeds.

In the new premium list which is now being distributed from the office of Secretary E. W. Randall, the rules governing these exhibits and the premiums in detail are set forth at length. For the national Shorthorn show a total of \$4,500 in premiums is offered. This includes a strong classification, open to the whole world, and in addition a group of premiums aggregating \$5,000 to be distributed among Minnesota breeders only. Supplementary to the latter is a fine trophy offered by the Merchants' Hotel of St. Paul for a herd of five animals exhibited by a Minnesota breeder. George R. Kibbe, the proprietor of the Merchants' hotel, spreads on the silver service offered as a trophy and the prize is one well worth competing for.

Cowan, assistant secretary of the Shorthorn association, Stockyards, Chicago.
