A NEW HOSPITAL ON THE EAST SIDE

PHYSICIANS ARE AGITATING FOR SUCH AN INSTITUTION.

Fraternal Orders Are Inclined to Co-operate—The Plan is to Organize a Stock Company and Not to Operate a Charitable Institution.

For some time there has been a quiet but strong agitation on the East Side for a local hospital. An association of physicians has been formed to formulate plans and to shape up the principles upon which the hospital will be founded and operated. Plans are still somewhat in embryo and the necessary funds are not in sight, but there is little doubt that the people on the East Side, numbering as they do between 50,000 and 60,000, when they realize the situation will not be slow in subscribing the amount needed. In fact, several of the fraternal orders have already signified their willingness to endow beds.

However, it is not intended that the hospital shall be a charity institution. Everything will be run on a business basis, on the principle of a stock company. Any one wishing to subscribe will receive the stock value of the subscription and an endeavor will be made to meet all expenses. If there is a surplus dividends will be paid.

It is designed to have from twenty-five to forty beds, and the hospital will be devoted to the medical practice rather than to surgery. When it is noticed under what extreme difficulties the East Side physicians labor in having to send their patients to the hospitals on the other side of the river, it can easily be seen what a tremendous advantage it will be for them to have a local hospital. In case of an emergency it is necessary for them to telephone until they can find some hospital ready to receive their patient. The delay is often distressing, perhaps fatal, and the distance to be covered is also a dangerous factor in some cases.

East Side physicians are unanimous and enthusiastic in praise of the proposed plan. Dr. Seth E. Howard and Dr. P. M. Hill of the Chute block, 119 University avenue SE, have been prominent in the movement.





NATIONAL GUARD IS O. K.

Inspection Shows Minnesota Regiment Ready for Service.
Minnesota's National Guard passed muster at the annual inspection this year by Major William Gerlach, whose report to the war department commended the equipment and discipline of the state militia. According to Adjutant General Libbey received official notice from John G. Guilfoyle, assistant adjutant general, that the inspection showed the Minnesota regiment to be "sufficiently armed, uniformed and equipped for active duty in the field." This means that the state will receive its full quota of government aid under the provisions of the Dick bill, which will amount to about \$1,000.

KILLED UNDER WHEELS

Young Man is Crushed Under Wagon in St. Paul.
Frank Holmquist, 27 West Acker street, St. Paul, was instantly killed by falling under the wheels of a heavy wagon at 8 o'clock last night. The horse started suddenly while Holmquist was trying to mount the wagon. He fell under the wheels and was crushed.
