LIND DECLINES TO HELP HEARST

SAYS THEY'VE BUT ONE THING IN COMMON.

He is Willing to Indorse Hearst's Work Against the Trusts, but Can Not Stand With Him in His Expansion and Navy Enlargement Ideas.

Congressman John Lind says there is only one thing he has in common with William Randolph Hearst, and that is opposition to the trusts.

A representative of the Hearst interests in Congress, Lind is at his office in the New York Life building Saturday. The visitor recited how he had always thought the former governor and present member of congress from the Fifth and one thing with which he could not agree with Mr. Lind, he could not understand how that gentleman could oppose the nomination of Mr. Hearst for the presidency by the democrats. And then Lind gave his caller an enlightenment.

"Hearst wasn't ever really in congress," he said. "Hearst never cast three votes in congress in his life. He was practically never present, habitually absent. There is only one thing I have in common with Hearst, and that is that the work he has done in opposition to the trusts. I give Mr. Hearst full credit for the information against the combines of coal carrying roads he brought to light and placed before the interstate commerce commission, and which was also placed in the hands of Attorney General Knox, who didn't see fit to do anything with it. But Hearst is an imperialist. I am an anti-imperialist. Hearst believes in having a larger navy. We, a country at peace with all the world are spending \$2,000,000 in building new war vessels. I cannot see need for a single new battleship. I do not believe in increasing our navy. With my beliefs, I am generally opposed to Hearst, how should I ever be expected to support him?"

The Hearst supporter was then dismissed, and Lind, with a statement that he, Lind, would be glad to talk with him again, but could not do so till week after next, as next week the congressmen are to be held on his fine farm on Christmas lake, where the fishing is excellent.

"TWOULD BAR HEARST MEN"

"Scheme" Said to Have Been Discovered by Antis.

The Hearst workers are charging that the anti-Hearst men are making a county democratic committee, are trying to work a game to shut the Hearst delegates out of the convention till after the temporary organization. It is charged that in precincts where the chairman is a Hearst man, credentials blanks which are sent out with the notices of the caucuses to be held Tuesday night, are being made out by the anti-Hearst ward chairman. The doorkeeper at Normanna hall, where the county convention is to be held, will be instructed to only admit delegates who have credentials. If this game is carried out, it will certainly provoke a merry war among the Hennepin county democrats, and perhaps result in the sending of two sets of democratic delegates to the state convention at Duluth.

W. H. Williams, manager of the Hearst workers in Hennepin, denies that the cancelling by Hearst of his contract for 150 rooms at St. Louis hotels and the closing of his Washington offices means he has pulled out of the campaign. "Hearst closed his headquarters in all the states after the conventions had been held," he says. "Hearst's headquarters were not paid for Minneapolis headquarters till June 11, and propose to stay in them till the county convention on that date—perhaps till the state convention, June 27."

LOOKING UP THE EVIDENCE

The Attorney General's Department is Preparing for Possible Trespass Suits.

The evidence in the timber trespass cases turned over by Governor Van Sant to Attorney General Donahower is being investigated.

Mr. Donahower declines to discuss the matter, saying that it would be improper for him to anticipate any action that may be taken. However, it is understood that facts cited in the report are being carefully looked up in order that the office may be sure of its ground before bringing any proceedings against the trespassers who got off so easily.

THE AVERAGE JUNE

Summaries of Conditions for Thirteen Years Are Issued.

The officials of the weather bureau have prepared some interesting data relative to the weather conditions for the month of June during the past thirteen years.

The normal temperature has been 68 degrees in the warmest month was in 1894, with an average of 73 degrees; the coldest, 1902, with an average of 64 degrees. June, 1897, shows the highest and also the lowest temperature in the period—91 degrees the 13th, and a drop to 36 degrees three days later, the 15th.

The average precipitation for the month is 3.75 inches; in about eight years in 1897—9 inches; the least in 1903—1.02 inches. South winds prevailed, with an average velocity of ten miles an hour.

A thirteen years' summary also shows that the average date of killing frosts was April 25, but that killing frosts has visited this district as late as May 20 (1892).

DROWNED AT MINNETONKA

Ole Peterson Capsizes Boat and Sinks in the Water.

Ole Peterson, while fishing with three of his friends at Lake Minnetonka, yesterday, was drowned. Peterson stood up in the boat and attempted to change his seat. The boat capsized and the occupants were thrown into the water. Peterson was unable to hold onto the boat and he went down after a brief struggle. His body was found in about eight miles from the shore. The body was brought to the city last night.

The Little Jap's Rations.

MAD GIRL'S SHOT WILL BE FATAL

RAY HARRISON, AT ST. MARY'S HOSPITAL, WILL DIE.

He Was Shot Last Night at Donnelly, Minn., by Meda Mahn, Who Completed the Tragedy by Killing Herself Instantly—Victim Reached Minneapolis To-day.

Ray W. Harrison, who was shot at Donnelly, Minn., last night by Miss Meda Mahn, an insane girl, who afterwards committed suicide, is at St. Mary's hospital and the surgeons say that he cannot recover. The bullet entered his back, penetrating the liver and stomach. After shooting Harrison, Miss Mahn turned the revolver on herself, killing herself instantly.

Ray Harrison is single, about 25. He has stood well in the community, and has taken a leading place not only in business but socially. His father is a large landowner in this and adjoining counties, and at present is living in Iowa.

Miss Mahn was the daughter of a farmer near Hector, Minn. She has worked in the hotels at Donnelly and Morris for some years.

After being away from Donnelly for two years she returned a day or two since and is said to have mentioned to one or two persons that she was coveting the property of Harrison. Last night she concealed herself in the room across the hall from Harrison's room, shot him as he turned around to close his door, and then shot herself in the heart, falling in front of the door.
