## COMMON TOAD IS FARMER'S FRIEND

Department of Agriculture Calls Attention to Despised Reptile's Merits.

From The Journal Bureau, Colorado Building, Washington.

Washington, June 4.—The government, thru the department of agriculture, has come to the defense of the common toad, and spoken a good word for it as the true friend of man. So much that it has been written and believed about this humble denizen of the road, fields, that a statement of his numerous good qualities, by a scientist who has spent many patient years in personal investigation, is thought to be timely; hence, the publication of farmers' bulletin, No. 196, which ought to secure for the toad a warm place in the heart of every thoughtful person.

It is a heavy tax which insects levy on agriculture, and much time has been given by scientists to the exploration of remedies for combating the pests. The general public is beginning to understand something of the value of birds as destroyers of noxious insects, and this understanding has taken concrete form in matters nearly all of the states, looking to the preservation of bird life, but apparently it is not generally known that toads, ugly as they are, are objects of disgust and even of fear to many people, perform a service for the farmer and gardener and for the public generally as important as that performed by birds.

### Long Standing Burden.

The toad is unfortunate-in that he has had to bear the burden of long standing and firmly fixed misrepresentation and prejudice. We have adopted in their entirety the principal European traditions concerning the toad as set forth by the very early writers on natural history. Hence in the popular thought this meek and harmless little animal is venomous and filled with all manner of uncleanliness. Among the best known traditions is that which credits the toad with producing warts on the hands. Others say that its breath is poisonous to infants, and that if killed by accident or design it will produce bloody milk in cows.

It should not be necessary to say that none of these traditions has the slightest foundation in fact, and that the toad, instead of being all these things, is a modest and reliable friend of the agriculturist everywhere, and does his full share in the work of freeing the earth of insect pests.

Government scientists have examined the stomachs of large numbers of toads for the purpose of securing definite information regarding their diet. From estimates made with great care, it is known that the average toad will, during one growing season, consume 2,160 cutworms, 1,800 myriapods, 2,160 sow bugs, 2,240 ants, 260 weevils, and 360 ground beetles. Many gardeners give a toad a penny for every cutworm found, and at this nominal figure the value of a single toad each season is \$21.60.

### Benefits Cities.

In cities and towns the toad has learned that the electric and even the gas street lights attract insects of all kinds, and so it happens that at night time, when the toad is abroad in the

land, he is to be seen in the vicinity of these lights. The feeding time lasts all night, and a toad fills and empties his stomach during the night.

In England the value of the toad is better understood than it is in this country, and there are cases where English gardeners have paid \$25 a hundred for toads, for colonizing purposes. Celia Thaxter, the well-known authoress, at one time found her beautiful gardens at Millbrook, Mass., overrun by insects and snails. A considerable number of toads were imported from the mainland with the result that the pests were suppressed and the flowers preserved.

There is a suggestion in the bulletin of the department of agriculture that if the toad were talked about in the public schools it would be a good thing for the public at large, since its chief enemy is the typical small boy.

### ROUT THE MOSQUITO

Marine Hospital Service Tells How to Do It.

From The Journal Bureau, Colorado Building, Washington.

Washington, June 4.—In connection with the effort which the United States, assisted by Mexico, is making this year to prevent a recurrence of yellow fever on this continent, a bulletin of instructions to the public regarding the mosquito and how to suppress it. These instructions so thoroughly educate those who read them that the public health authorities in this country think they should be carefully read by every citizen, not so much as a guard against yellow fever, which is confined to the southern states, but against the numerous other diseases which the mosquito is supposed to carry. If compared with the pestiferous mosquito section of the country which should have a mosquito plague. The instructions follow:

- First—Mosquitoes breed only in deposits of clear water.
  - Second—Mosquitoes live in the vicinity where they breed.
  - Third—The larvae of the mosquito live in the water from seven to twelve days. Notwithstanding that their bodies are in the water, the mosquito larvae must rise to the surface to breathe the air.
  - Fourth—If the surface of the water is covered with petroleum the larvae can not breathe and will die.
  - Fifth—Destroy the water deposits where the mosquitoes breed by leveling, filling, or draining.
  - Sixth—Empty all tubs, buckets, flower pots, vases, etc., at least every two days.
  - Seventh—All pools, ditches or wells should be filled with water.
  - Eighth—Water intended for beasts, chickens and other animals should be changed daily.
  - Ninth—All water that can not be drained should be covered with petroleum—30 grams to each square meter of surface. The oil does not injure the water for use if it is drawn from below by means of a pump or other means.
  - Tenth—All cisterns, wells or tanks in daily use should be covered with wire screens and nets.
  - Eleventh—Vegetation around pools or wells of water should be destroyed as it furnishes shelter for the adult mosquito.
  - Twelfth—The cleanliness should be observed in vacant blocks and lots, and all trash should be burned.

## RUSSELL SAGE VS. VACATIONS

The Aged Millionaire Says They Are Booty Stolen from Employers.

New York, June 4.—The June number of the Independent, just out, publishes the following from the pen of Russell Sage under the heading, "The Justice of Vacations."

"During the eighty-three years of my career I have not once taken a vacation. A young man said to me the other day, 'Mr. Sage, would you not have taken a vacation if you had worked for some one else?' I replied that I would not. I never have been an advocate of what some persons term the vacation habit."

"When I was a boy the practice was not in vogue. As a matter of fact, I was so glad to get a chance to learn business that the idea of asking my employer to make me a present of two weeks' time that belonged to him because he had paid me for it, would have been preposterous."

"Neither did any of my youthful associates take vacations. I am sure you will agree with me that the fact did not retard their progress when they say that among them were Thurlow Weed, Horace Greeley, Governor Seward and George Jones."

"I think the 'vacation habit' an outgrowth of idleness and distorted business methods. Let us assume that an employer and his clerk make an agreement to exchange just remuneration for reasonable services. Each one keeps his part of the agreement. Are they not then quits? If there is any obligation I think it is on the part of the clerk who avails himself of the credit, skill and organization of the employer."

"Suppose we were to reverse the conventional order of things, and instead of the clerk demanding two weeks' pay gratis, his employer should demand two weeks' work without pay as a condition of retaining the clerk in his employ. What a tremendous howl would go up."
