## MINNESOTA 5 PER CENT CUT IN FREIGHT RATE

### NEW DISTRIBUTING TARIFF WRESTED FROM THE ROADS.

Fergus Falls, St. Cloud, Crookston and Moorhead Wholesalers Placed on the Same Basis as Those of Twin Cities and Duluth—Concessions Secured After Years of Work.

Special to the Journal. Fergus Falls, Minn., June 6.—The new distributing tariff, which this and other cities have been endeavoring to secure for several years, went into effect on local railroads Saturday. The tariff applies to Fergus Falls, St. Cloud, Crookston and Moorhead, and makes an average reduction in rates on outgoing freight estimated by local wholesalers at 5 per cent. It places the cities to which it applies on the same basis as the twin cities and Duluth.
