CITY NEWS. COMMENCEMENT AT EAST HIGH

PURSUERS SEE PRISONER DROWN

HARKINS CARRIED OUT HIS THREAT TO ESCAPE.

Eighteen-Year-Old Thief Fells Workhouse Guard and, Fleeing for Liberty, Plunges Into River—May Have Been Shot—Body Not Recovered.

While swimming the river in an attempt to escape from the workhouse, Edward Harkins, serving an eighty-day sentence for larceny, was drowned near Camden Place yesterday afternoon. Whether he was hit by any of his pursuers' bullets will not be known until the body is recovered. Harkins was at work in the cell block yesterday afternoon when Hallmaster C. L. Deterly opened the outside door to allow the applicant to be taken to the kitchen. Harkins quietly removed his shoes and crept close to Deterly. Suddenly he dealt him a staggering blow and made a dash for the door. Deterly followed and saw Harkins running across the fields toward the river. He fired four shots at the fleeing man in the upper part of his back. Superintendent McDonald and Guards Hoban and Reick joined him. Harkins continued directly toward the river and Guard Hoban was scarcely a block behind when he reached the shore. Without hesitation the fleeing man plunged into the stream and swam toward the other shore. There he paused for an instant and when he saw Guard Hoban take a boat and start toward him he plunged into the water and swam toward the other shore. Reick fired three shots toward the man, but the witnesses say that none of them hit the thief. Later, however, he threw up his hands and sank from sight. The river was watched closely, but the man did not appear again. It was reported that work on the shore say that he was undoubtedly drowned. Harkins was in police court Tuesday charged with the theft of a bicycle. Judge Holt sentenced him to eighty days and immediately upon his arrival at the workhouse he gave the guards notice that he would escape at the first opportunity. It was for this reason that Superintendent McDonald had assigned him to work in the cell block, one of the most secure rooms.

THOUSANDS SEE ART EXHIBITION

OPENING OF BEARD ROOMS AT THE DAYTON STORE.

Joint Venture of Messrs. Beard and Dayton Pronounced a Success—New Departments Charming Arranged—Many Choice Pictures on View.

There was a veritable art exhibition, which thousands of people took advantage of, at the Dayton Store last night. It was the "opening" night of the Beard Art rooms and the beautiful tea-room on the fourth floor of the Dayton Building, and Miss Adella Hawes, with her best clothes on, seemed to be out en masse to enjoy art and music, and the people were well paid for their visit. The "opening" night was a revelation from an artistic standpoint. Everybody was charmed by the simple, elegant style of the new features. The elevators open into a large reception hall, where a fountain plays in the center, surrounded by plants. The walls are hung with pictures, a light golden brown, and white Ionic pillars rise supporting a lattice work which permits a subdued light to filter thru. Here and there by the cases of vases and curios and pieces of statuary, seats are placed inviting rest and observation. All art merchandise is displayed in a green room, facing Nicollet avenue, with woodwork of a dark brown, and the art gallery, where are now the choicest pictures of the collection of Thomas Lowry and T. B. Walker, is just adjoining.

In his oration, Harold C. Deering, one of the two salutatorians, dealt with the commercial citizen, scoring the valedictory of the young orator to the governing bodies as well as the apathy of the average citizen toward matters of government. The remedy suggested by the young orator to awaken civic pride was municipal ownership. In an essay, graceful and clear in style, Miss Lura B. Oakley considered the fund of unused literary material that Minnesota possesses, dealing particularly with the Indian legends and life in the lumber camps of the northern country.
