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Whistler, LaTouche, Alexander, Pickford Marriott and Lucien Monod. The June number of "Masters in Art" contains reproductions of twelve paintings of Vermeer of Delft, a well-known and popular painter of the seventeenth century, as well as a biography and criticism. Perhaps the most salient feature in his pictures is his arrangement of light, his skill and daring in working thru a shadowed foreground with a flood of light at the rear and middle portions. For the most part there is a consciousness of detail not pleasing to the modern mind, though "The Lace-maker," a small canvas done in broad treatment, with flat tones, more nearly approaches the ideas of twentieth century art.

"Korean Ceramics," by Randolph I. Geare, in the June issue of Ceramic Studio, is an article of unusual interest, accompanied with illustrations showing many of the picturesque shapes in Korean pottery. The article traces the development of the industry during the last 500 years, weaving into his discussion many interesting references to native customs. There are some unusually good studies by Emma A. Ervin, Russell Goodwin and Jeanne M. Stewart.
