BURNS STANDS UP FOR THE NEWSIES

IS GOING TO SEE THEIR RIGHTS RESPECTED.

Indignant at Treatment of One Little Street Merchant by a Policeman, He Carries the Matter to Superintendent Conroy, but Won't Stop There.

Has a newsboy any rights that the police are bound to respect? As a merchant disposing of his wares to the passing throng in the streets, can he be treated as a criminal and told to move on when he gets into certain territory held by the police to be sacred, but part of the public streets all the same? These are questions that are raised by Mr. Burns, whose tendency to befriend the down-trodden has already borne fruit in the drinking fountains he has provided for dogs. Mr. Burns was seeing a friend off at the union station to-day and an emerging was besought by a small news merchant to buy. He did so, whereupon a big policeman came along and told the newsboy to get away and keep away from the station, but emphasized the order by hauling the youngster along as far as First street by the slack of his coat.

Mr. Burns was indignant. The more he thought about it the more indignant he grew. He hunted up the policeman and asked why the patrolman was at first disposed to refuse any information, but as Mr. Burns kept his indignation well in hand and asked why with increasing firmness, the police declared that he acted under orders.

Whereupon the indefatigable Mr. Burns sought out Superintendent Conroy and said the chief of the men had orders to drive newsboys away from the union station. Why? Well, they were nuisances. They annoyed strangers and others by trying to sell them their wares. He urged Mr. Burns to carry out his duty. But, urged Mr. Burns, hadn't they a right to do so? He wanted a paper and was glad to buy one of the boy's. And, he said, he would be sure to do so. At least a nuisance. The chief was unconvinced. They were nuisances, and that was all there was to it. Mr. Burns pointed out that the newsboys were at the union station, that they were at Nicollet avenue and Fourth street, for instance. Why chase them from one locality and not the other?

Mr. Burns suspects that some one is trying to protect the newspaper sales of the news company which controls the rights with the union station and on trains, but he cannot understand by what authority these rights can be extended to the public streets adjacent to the station. He is sure that he made his purchase on the public street and not on the property of the union station company.

And, as Mr. Burns said, he really "wings" it, it looks as if a champion of the "newsies" had arisen who may do more than merely ask uncomfortable questions.

A crisp tenner changed hands.


"Brother, I'm grinded with a fellow feeling for the loser."

WHEAT DOING WELL

In Fact, All Grains but Corn Are Fairly Humpling.

Weather and crop conditions in Minnesota for the week ending yesterday are thus summarized by Section Director Outram in the regular weather bureau bulletin:

Rains fell in the Red river valley, for the most part, during the 6th and 7th morning of the 5th. Elsewhere in the state there was very little rain during the week. The temperatures were low for the season, the 6th and 7th, but later in the week they were higher, the highest reported being 65 degrees at New Ulm on the 10th. The conditions have been favorable for all the crops except corn, which needs warmer weather. The oats are early and are growing well, and they are maturing. Flax is growing, and the later sown is coming up. Small areas of flax and barley are still being sown on newly broken land. Rye is beginning to head. In most sections the crop is poor and thin. Pastureage is generally abundant. Wild hay promises a good crop. Last year's seedling of clover looks well, and the later seedlings of timothy promise better than the timothy sown. Corn is still backward because of poor seed and unfavorable weather, and a good deal of replanting has had to be done. The earlier plantings are being cultivated. Early potatoes are in bloom. Apples and wild blueberries are fruited well, and the strawberry crop is generally good, and it is beginning to ripen. Blackberries and raspberries are in full bloom. Gooseberries are being marketed.

TO DISCUSS FRUITS

Growers Will Consider Their Culture and Exhibition at Agricultural Meetings.

Strawberry and rose growers are looking forward to the premium contest exhibit to be held at the state experimental farm, St. Anthony Park, Friday, June 24. The day will be given up to the regular summer meeting of the Minnesota State Agricultural society.

In the morning a tour of the garden will be made under the guidance of the professors and the afternoon, at 2 o'clock, the reports from the fruit exhibit at the world's fair will be read and practical talks on fruits and the preparation for exhibits will be given.

ARCHBISHOP ORDAINS

Fifteen Students of St. Paul's Theological Seminary Become Priests.

Archbishop Ireland conducted the ordination ceremonies of St. Paul's theological seminary at St. Mary's chapel, St. Paul, yesterday. He was assisted by the Very Rev. P. R. Heffron, D. D., rector of the seminary. 
