Chicago, June 16.—"Washington Park authorities will not permit gambling in any form at the derby on Saturday." This statement was made yesterday by Secretary James Howard in the presence of Assistant Chief of Police Schuetter and Assistant Corporation Counsel Michael Sullivan. It was made under the pressure of Mayor Harrison's threat to revoke the amusement license of the park and in reply to Schuetter's warning that if the park officials countenanced or protected gambling on derby day it would be at their own peril.
