"We can't hear about it now," interrupted a fat man with presence of mind. "We must to the rescue." "I'll get a boat," said the policeman, and off he ran, followed by several men who women busied themselves with comforting the unfortunate nurse-maid, who continued to weep herself into such a high pitch of excitement that she became hysterical. Then the good women did what their hands full, so full that they didn't see the policeman and his companions put out in a boat a dozen yards west of the bridge. Being their combined strength to the oars they pulled mightily, but made slow headway thru the thick water. Less than seven minutes later the boat was felt by the bridge. The child Fauntleroy could not be seen.

"Where is he?" shouted the policeman, looking up to the bridge. "He's probably drowned, that's what he is," answered an elderly woman in an angry tone. "He's had time to drown a dozen times since you started. You're the slowest person I ever saw. I just wish I were a man." All was still, save for the convulsive sobs of the nurse-maid. Then surprise inexpressible was felt by all, and the nurse-maid screamed for joy when a childish voice—little Fauntleroy's—was heard: "I ain't drowned, nurse. I's here."

"Where, where, dear?" called the nurse, leaning over the bridge and looking down into the green water. "Here, nurse. Here I is. There sat the child on the shore, his golden curls glistening in the afternoon sun. A moment later nurse had him in her arms, and she wept some more. "How did you get out of the lake?" asked the girl. "Why, nurse," said the child. "I dust crawled to the shore on that soft, green sedge on the water. Ain't it nice? Just like carpet."

Another policeman arriving, a rope was lowered from the bridge and the policeman, the fat man and their two comrades were hoisted out of the boat, which was extricated two hours later by two strong horses.

KEEPING THE CITY'S BOOKS

OFFICIALS DISCUSS APPLICATION OF THE NEW SYSTEM OF MUNICIPAL ACCOUNTING PROPOSED BY EXPERTS.

City hall officials are discussing with much interest the amplified report of Jones, Caesar & Co. on the first results of the installation of the system of municipal accounting and recommendations for the future. They are particularly interested in the system of inside checking and accounting, which they realize will revolutionize some methods now employed, but which they concede places the city's finances on a more economical basis.

The general effect will be to increase the authority and importance of the city controller and city treasurer, who are elected by the people and responsible to them, and to diminish the power of a number of officials appointed by the city council or some of the municipal boards, who may strive to please the appointing power rather than the people. The paying of all money direct to the city treasurer will abolish the "unsafe practice" of permitting bills to be altered in the office in which they are collected without the knowledge of other departments. There will be considerable difficulty in establishing a complete check in the poor department, as the patrons are provided with orders for groceries, wood and transportation in a way that permits irregularities. It is believed that it would be inadvisable to check the library board's receipts, as they are so numerous, the
