

# BADGER SHERIFF IS SHOT DOWN

### HARRIS OF ST. CROIX MURDERED BY UNIDENTIFIED MAN.

#### Tragedy on a Train Out of Eau Claire—Stranger Arrested on Suspicion Kills the Officer and Escapes Before a Hand Can Be Lifted—Armed Men in Pursuit.

Eau Claire, Wis., June 20.—Several parties of well-armed citizens and one company of the Wisconsin militia are searching the country in the vicinity of Little Falls and Augustus, Wis., for the man who shot and killed Sheriff Harry Harris of St. Croix county, Wisconsin, on an Omaha train near Little Falls. It is believed the fugitive cannot long elude arrest.

The sheriff started from Eau Claire Saturday evening to get a man who was wanted for some offense at Roberts, Wis., and as he passed thru Roberts heard of a robbery at one of the hotels.

When the description of the hotel robber was given to him, he was struck at once by the fact that it was identical in almost every detail with the description of a man accused of a recent murder at Havre, Mont.

Sheriff Harris made inquiries at Eau Claire when he reached that place. A police officer told him that such a man had spent the day in Eau Claire, and he believed was about to leave on the same train by which the sheriff was traveling.

The police officer volunteered to go thru the train with Harris to look for the man, but Harris said he would search the train as it had started for the hotels.

In the smoker Harris found a young man whose appearance closely corresponded with the description he had in mind. He began to question him, but the man soon became impatient and started to leave. Harris then announced himself, and taking hold of the man by the lapel of his coat, was about to push him back into the seat, when the man suddenly drew a revolver and fired three shots.

The first struck Harris in the face at the side of the nose, the second in the back of the head, and the third in the left arm.

Although there were perhaps twenty men in the smoking car, the shooting was done so quickly that before any one realized what had happened the murderer had jumped from the moving train.

It has been learned that he stole a horse and buggy and drove to Augusta, Minn., where he is believed to be.

Company C of the militia, stationed at Hudson, has been ordered out to hunt for the murderer.

Harris was a resident of Baldwin, Wis., was 44 years old and popular. Funeral will take place Tuesday.

Jensen, Clark's Grove, 98½, all of Minnesota. Other honors were scattered widespread over the other states and represent many different counties.

### TRIPLE SHOOTING AT WORLD'S FAIR

#### Col. Zach Mulhall, Cattle King, Turns Gun Loose Over Daughter's Dispute.

St. Louis, June 20.—Colonel Zach Mulhall, Oklahoma's cattle king, the father of Lucile Mulhall, the champion steer roper of the world, and the friend of President Roosevelt and of former President Grover Cleveland, shot three men at the Wild West show on the Pike in the world's fair ground.

The shooting was the culmination of a quarrel between Mulhall and three cowboys of the Wild West show. Mulhall is held under arrest without bail. Six cowboys are held in jail as witnesses.

The trouble grew out of the amount of food which was being furnished to horses in the Cummings Wild West show, in which Mulhall has an interest.

Mulhall's daughter, who became famous thruout the southwest a few months ago by winning the \$10,000 prize for being the champion steer roper of the world, is one of the star attractions of the show, and she has seen to it that the half dozen horses owned by her father get extra good care.

Frank Reed, manager for Cummings' Wild West show, has objected to the quantity of food furnished the animals. This objection caused an angry altercation between Mulhall and Reed prior to the afternoon performance.

The quarrel was renewed when the Mulhall horses were returned from the ring at the night performance.

"I'll finish the matter right now," said Mulhall, and blazed away with his revolver.

Before the gun play ended three men were lying wounded, one of them, Frank Reed, more than fatally.

The victims of Mulhall's revolver are being cared for at the Emergency hospital. They are:

MORGAN, ERNEST, 18 years old, of St. Louis; shot in the stomach.

MURRAH, JOHN, shot in the stomach.

### BOTHSWEPT DOWNSTREAM

#### HEROIC DEATH OF ERNEST RICH OF MONTANA DRIVES HIS SWEETHEART INSANE.

Helena, Mont., June 20.—Ernest Rich, aged 22, a well-known resident of Hamilton, was drowned last night in Bitter Root river while trying to rescue Harry Bullock, a boy aged 9, who was also swept down stream to his death. All efforts to recover the bodies have failed.

Miss Anna Strong, sweetheart of Rich, who was walking with him when he sprang into the river, has lost her mind and is under a doctor's care, while the mother of Rich is almost insane because of the loss of her oldest son.

Bullock fell in the water while fishing and was soon enveloped in one of the numerous whirlpools. His predicament was observed by Rich, who did not even take time to remove his coat before essaying his rescue. He succeeded in reaching the little fellow, but unrecurrently proved too strong and both were swept away.
