MRS. WEBER BEAT ASSAILANTS WITH HER UMBRELLA.

Attacked in Lonely Spot on North Side, She Defends Herself from Robbers While Her Companion, Mrs. Thomas, Flees for Help, Carrying the Purse.

As a result of an assault and attempted robbery by five men last Saturday night, Mrs. E. Weber, 3417 Penn avenue N., has suffered seriously from convulsions and nervous prostration.

When Mrs. E. Weber said she was returning from a wedding anniversary celebration on the South Side, they were the only people on the car at the terminus at Thirty-second street.

One of the men sprang forward, seized Mrs. Weber and demanded her pocketbook. She grabbed her umbrella firmly and proceeded to beat the robber assiduously with all her strength.

When safety was in sight Mrs. Weber succumbed to the excitement and fainted. She was taken home by the policemen, and it was found that she had received a blow on the head.

There have been several other hold-ups and robberies in the same neighborhood during the past year. It is thought that it is the work of a gang, and that it could be stamped out by continued effort were made by the police.

LOCAL FINNS PUZZLED

SIGNIFICANCE OF RECENT OUTBREAK IS A MYSTERY TO THOSE FAMILIAR WITH THE EXISTING CONDITIONS.

Finns in Minneapolis are much surprised over the outbreak at Helsingfors, in which eighteen Russian fugitives were arrested, and a loss to explain it or make any predictions as to future events. They do not know whether it is the signal for a general revolution or simply an ill-timed outbreak of a few hoodlums.

That the Finns have had provocations without number is generally admitted, and the only circumstance that has prevented forcible resistance to the Russian decrees has been the disparity in numbers, all Finland numbering only 2,000,000 as against 140,000,000 of Russians.

Helsingfors outbreak presages a general revolution as the Swedish and Finnish papers in Finland have hitherto pursued a policy of neutrality. Gustaf F. Bergstad of this city, who is a close student of the course of events in Finland confesses that he does not know what to make of the outbreak, but says that the Finns are really aroused and are united Russia will have some serious business in Finland for a while in spite of the overwhelming superiority in men and wealth.
