MILLERS HAD LITTLE TROUBLE WITH BLUES.

Kansas City Fans Smile at Gear's Promise to Strengthen the Team—Watkins Has Strengthened the Minneapolis Team—Thomas a Puzzle.

Special to The Journal. Kansas City, June 23.—Minneapolis turned on the blues yesterday afternoon and defeated them in hollow air. There was a total lack of team work on the part of the locals and five errors were charged up to them. Baseball fans are at a loss to understand the sudden reversal in form, as the Gearties played like old champions in the doubleheader of the day previous.

Thomas was on the slab for the visitors and was effective through the game. Cyster played a fast game at short, with but one bungle. Durham pitched for the locals and while he was steady his support was not of a nature to allow him to win. The game passed off quite easily, but this was due to the speed of the visitors, who lost no time in getting the locals back into the field when they came in to the bench.

Manager Gear has issued a statement to the effect that he would strengthen the Kansas City before the team returns from the present trip, but this only causes a smile on the part of local fans. The promise has been made so frequently and nothing has come of it that they are growing suspicious. Watkins has materially strengthened the millers since their last appearance here and there is a general wonder whether the men should have been able to win a game from them by say nothing of taking a doubleheader. BADGER CREWS ARE CONFIDENT

START MADE FOR POUGHKEEPSIE REGATTA.

Late Spring with Ice-Bound Waters Delayed the Early Practice, but the Eight and Four Have Been Rowing in Close to Record Time.

Special to The Journal. Madison, Wis., June 23.—The Wisconsin university eight and four left this morning for Poughkeepsie, N. Y., where they will take part in the big intercollegiate regatta next Tuesday. The two shells were shipped in a special express car yesterday evening.

Coach Andy O'Dea says that his charges are in splendid physical condition and have been rowing in fine form for several weeks. The crews have been rowing against time during the last few days, and while no official announcement has been made, it is understood that both have done their distances in record time. If there is no reversal in form or condition during the regatta, the crews of the old men "Pa" Jordan, captain, and Stevenson, last year's captain, are the stars and the best known. Stevenson is rowing the stroke seat, and is regarded as one of the best men who have held that position on a varsity crew. Captain Jordan is at No. 6, the same place he held last year. Both he and Stevenson have been rowing four years on the varsity. The other two men are Miller at No. 7, who is rowing his third year, and Bartlett at No. 2, who is also rowing his third year. The new men are Behm, Yarn, Moore, Ewing and Davis. Schumacher rowed at the bow on the freshman crew two years ago, and was a candidate for a place on the varsity last year but he was compelled to give up training in the middle of the season. Van Meter and Burling were both members of last year's freshman crew. Davis is the only freshman on the crew. He is strong and heavy, but his work is not as smooth as that of the other men in the shell. "Buck" Sawyer is coxswain, a position he has held since last year. The four crew consists of Reed at stroke, Bodenbach at No. 2, Dean at No. 3, and Chrisman at bow. They are the pick of the freshman crew and varsity substitutes. They are regarded as being as strong as the eight.

The crews will arrive at Poughkeepsie Friday and will spend most of the day in straightening out the kinks in their oars and arms and in rigging the shells for their first spin on the Hudson Saturday. The crews of the other contesting universities are at the regatta. The other institutions represented are Cornell, Georgetown, Pennsylvania, Syracuse and Columbia.

Rowing in Wisconsin is at a somewhat disadvantage with that at the eastern institutions because the lakes here are so late in opening, thus giving but a short time for practice. The varsity crew, however, has been practicing since the middle of April before the crews could get on the water.

The Wisconsin crews have always made a creditable showing in the east, and have done more to advertise the state university in that section of the country than any other athletic agency. The varsity first sent a crew east in 1895, when the badgers overwhelmingly defeated the Yale freshmen. That year the badgers also defeated the Yale varsity crew. The following year Wisconsin rowed its first race in the Poughkeepsie regatta, and got third place, Pennsylvania winning and Cornell being second. Cornell had previously beaten Yale and Harvard that season in 1897. Wisconsin was second at Poughkeepsie, and it was not for the fact that a berry crate floated into the course would probably have won. In 1900 the Wisconsin crew was second at Poughkeepsie, and the varsity was second at Poughkeepsie. In 1901 Wisconsin was third, in 1902 second and 1903 third. When it is remembered that there have been from four to six competitors in each race at Poughkeepsie, the showing of the Wisconsin crews can be better appreciated.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., June 23.—It has always been argued that the outside crews have an advantage for the reason that the tide flows stronger near the outside course. WILHUA VICTOR AT WHITE BEAR

MINNETONKA BOAT A WONDER IN SPEED.

Loudon Brothers' Boat to Compete in Final Trials at Oshkosh, and Has Little Apparent Opposition for First Honors—A Trophy Presentation.

Wilhua vanquished the White Bear fleet in the trial races and will be taken to Oshkosh for the final trials, where she will meet the Alpha and the Massasoit model rowing club. The final races at White Bear were held yesterday afternoon and resulted in a hollow victory for the Minnetonka boat.

The weather was Wilhua's, altho the wind was stately and squally. It was the first afternoon since blowing north that showing made by the Minnetonka boat left no doubt in the minds of the St. Paul yachtsmen that they were beaten, altho they were pleased to lay hands on the Wilhua. The racing committee of the White Bear club last night by Loudon brothers, and if she goes to Canada as the challenger she will be handled by White Bear sailors and the White Bear pennant. Should she win, however, the glory of the victory will go to the Minnetonka Boat club, altho the White Bear contingent will hold the Seawanhaka cup.

Loudon brothers were surprised last night at the White Bear clubhouse when they were arraigned before the yachtsmen present and given a beautiful trophy cup. The local yachtsmen had no knowledge that a cup had been hung up for the winning boat and the award crowned the pleasure of the victory.

"We have no fear of the results at Oshkosh," said Hugh Loudon this morning. "If the Wilhua gets the wind I believe that she will outdo anything in her class in America. Yesterday was the first time we had our kind of a day and the way she performed filled us with wonder. We carried all sorts of sail, up to the limit of the rule, in fact, and carried it most of the way. Wilhua fairly flew and the wash was little or nothing. During the afternoon I don't think she shipped over a bucket of water.

"We have no fear of the Alpha and have beaten a boat of the Massasoit model class, altho the boat now building will be larger. She cannot carry any more sail than the Wilhua under the rules, and the big body may prove a disadvantage. In my opinion the Wilhua will go to Montreal and will bring the Seawanhaka cup to the rowing club."

EMPEROR AT REGATTA. Rain Spilled Opening Day of Racing at Kiel.

The German war vessels that were present were the Kaiser's yacht, the entrance to the canal to the shipbuilding yards in the center of town.

Vanderbilt's Warrior and Mrs. Robert Golet's Nahma. The stars and stripes and the union jack were much in evidence, and almost every class of boat except the smallest was present.

Emperor William arrived at 5 o'clock in the afternoon and was accompanied by Prince Henry of Prussia, and the emperor's wife. The emperor and his family were seated on the balcony of the Kaiser's yacht, and watched the regatta from the entrance to the canal to the shipbuilding yards in the center of town.

ROCKING CHAIR GOLF. Travis Says American Links Are Far Too Comfortable.

New York, June 22.—Walter J. Travis, who was a passenger on the steamer Oceanic, which arrived from Liverpool yesterday, declared last night that he did not expect to win the golf championship when he went to England.

"My game was bad," he said, "half a stroke less than normal. It seemed as if everything was wrong. Afterward I improved, and at the end of the competition I was playing fairly well. The result was a surprise to the Englishmen, who estimated the game largely by the matches I played when I was last over. They play better golf on the other side than we do here. They have no less than twenty scratch players to our one. They have played longer courses, and they have played on more narrow and more repulsive with hazards than ours. Our courses are too easy, and it is useless to hope for great players being developed under these conditions."
