Harry Silberberg's latest matrimonial victim—a Minneapolis girl—has brought suit for divorce.

The Minneapolis plaintiff is Bonnie Hinkle, a prominent family here, who married the swindler and now sues him under his alias John Jeffrey Carlisle.

Cruel Treatment Alleged. The part of the defendant is alleged and immediately after their marriage, he not only misused her physically but cruelly assaulted her.

The plaintiff further alleges that, "from time to time during their married life the defendant, by fraud, false representations and by other means, procured sums of money from her parents which he spent in dissipation and idleness."

Called the Coachman. An affidavit is filed with the complaint in which it is alleged that the present whereabouts of the defendant are unknown and a motion for the service of the summons and complaint by publication is made.
