NEW YORK COTTON, June 28.—The cotton market opened weak at a decline of 22@24 points on the old crop and of 6@13 points on the new crop months, in response to the liquidation following surprisingly weak cables and favorable weather accounts. It was the first July notice day, and notices to the extent of some 20,000 bales were said to be circulating. It was reported, however, that they were being taken care of, and following the call the market steadied upon covering, with the net loss cut down to a matter of 3@10 points. Toward the end of the first hour, however, it was seen that part of the notices were reaching the pit, and the entire list weakened under a renewal of liquidation, with prices selling down to a net loss of 1@30 points on the old and of 8@10 points on the new crop, ruling very irregular and unsettled.


