BURIAL OF BOTH IN ONE GRAVE YALE'S OARSMEN WIN THE VARSITY

ROBERMAN OF MADISON, WIS., KILLS HIMSELF IN CHICAGO. Elis Win Eights, Harvard Fours, in Sadly Managed Program.

Broken-Hearted by the Suicide of His Wife in the Same City on Wednesday Night—Shot Which Ended His Life Fired in the Home of a Relative.

Chicago, July 1.—Grieving over the death of his wife, who committed suicide at the Sherman house Wednesday night, Jacob Frank, an Indiana fruit merchant of Madison, Wis., shot and killed himself at 7 o'clock last night at the home of his wife's brother, Jacob Frank, in Indiana Harbor, a suburb of Chicago.

After twenty-three years of married life he would not let even death part him from the woman he loved. Broken-hearted by the suicide of his wife, he was buried in the same grave. The double funeral will take place at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Robertman, prostrated with grief, arrived in Chicago from Madison yesterday in response to a telegram telling him of his wife's death. He looked haggard and worn and was accompanied by his adopted daughter, Miss Laura Robertman, who was on the verge of collapse.

Robertman would not explain why his wife died. He and Jacob Frank, his brother-in-law, after making arrangements for the funeral, went to Frank's home at Indiana Harbor. Robertman, however, was heartbroken. Not for a moment could he stifle his sobs. He went to a room immediately after reaching his brother-in-law's house and remained there until 10 o'clock, when he was heard and members of the family rushed in to find him expiring from a bullet wound. In his hand he grasped the revolver with which he had fired the shot.

THREE DAYS OF SONG FESTIVAL OF NORTHWESTERN SCANDINAVIAN SINGERS AT GRAND FORKS NEXT WEEK. Special to The Journal. Grand Forks, N. D., July 1.—Arrangements are practically completed for the seventeenth annual festival of the Northwestern Scandinavian Singers' association, to be held here July 7, 8 and 9. Grand concerts will be held on the evenings of July 7 and 8 at 8 o'clock, and on the morning of July 9 at 10 o'clock. Provision has been made for seating 2,500 persons.

SAENGERBUND OF NORTHWEST Multitude to Visit Milwaukee the Last Four Days of July. Special to The Journal. Milwaukee, July 1.—The tide is already setting toward Milwaukee, where will be held the twenty-seventh annual festival of the Saengerbund of the northwest, July 28 to 31 inclusive. One hundred thousand persons are expected to visit Milwaukee the four last days of July. The program of the song festival consists of five concerts in the Exposition building. A body of soloists, each ranking as an international vocalist, are secured, including Mme. Ernestine Schumann-Heink, contralto; Mrs. Minnie Fish-Griffin, soprano; Ellison Van Hoese, tenor; and Arthur Van Zwyer, baritone. These will be assisted by choruses ranging all the way from 2,500 to 4,000 voices.

HOME FROM JAPAN Mrs. Palmer Impressed by the Conservatism of the People. Special to The Journal. Sioux City, Iowa, July 1.—Mrs. E. C. Palmer, wife of the former mayor of Sioux City, returned yesterday from a three-months' tour of Japan. She says there are few tourists in Japan, but that there is no reason for this, as the country is prosperous and Americans are not interfered with. She remarked the uniform conservatism displayed by the people, even when the news of victories is announced there is no display, the people believing it unwise to become enthusiastic too early. News of the war is published only in official bulletins and these are not discussed or repeated. The troops are vociferously cheered as they pass, but afterwards the people settle down to their ordinary life.

SAM HAISLET IS DEAD A Veteran Newspaper Man of Minnesota and Iowa. Special to The Journal. Sioux City, Iowa, July 1.—Sam S. Haislet, who for over twenty years was editor of the Hiron, Minn., Guardian and the Adrian Guardian, died yesterday at Ord, Neb., of paralysis, aged 67. His son is editor of the Red Lake Falls Gazette. Haislet senior was one of the first white children born in Iowa and was a veteran newspaper man, having published papers at McGregor, Lansing, Decorah and Calmar, in Iowa.
