CRIME RAMPANT AT BUTTE

FOUR BURGLARIES IN A NIGHT—BUSINESSMEN SANDRAGGED—SALOON PATRONS HELD UP.

Butte, Mont., July 8.—Three masked men last night held up the Mandolin saloon, robbing the proprietor, Andrew Mandolis, of \$500 in cash, \$500 worth of jewelry and a dozen bottles of champagne.

Butte is in the throes of an epidemic of holdups, several being reported to the police every night of the past week. In the last ten days six saloons have been held up and over twenty persons made the victims of highwaymen.

Early today a man and woman were held up by masked men and \$72 taken from them. Bert Cheely, a tailor, while taking the measurement for a prospective suit, was sandragged by his supposed patron and robbed of \$30. There were four burglaries here last night.

UNION STATION BURNED

SUPERIOR'S RAILWAY BUILDING WAS OF FRAME AND MELTED AWAY LIKE TINDER.

Superior, Wis., July 8.—Superior's union station burned at 3 o'clock this morning. Only one man was in the station and it is not known how the fire started. It seemed to originate in the baggage room and spread rapidly.

The building was frame and burned like tinder. It was practically down to the ground in half an hour after the fire started.

The building was put up in 1885 at a cost of about \$15,000. It is not known whether it was insured or not, as the insurance had expired and no notice of a renewal has been received.

MINNESOTA'S GROUP A CENTER OF ATTRACTION.

Discovery of St. Anthony Falls by Father Hennepin Depicted in Butter by Artist J. K. Daniels—The Dakotas, Iowa, Wisconsin and Other Northwestern States Splendidly Represented.

World's Fair, St. Louis, July 8.—The dairy exhibit of Minnesota is attracting much attention from visitors since the late butter contest. The various statues in butter are a popular feature of the Agricultural building. They are displayed in a large case about fifty feet long and twenty-five feet wide. Minnesota is represented by a group of figures which occupies two sections and depicts the discovery of St. Anthony Falls by Father Hennepin. The explorer is shown stepping from a canoe upon the shore. He is dressed in the garb of a trader and carries a staff in his right hand, and stands with his left hand upraised as tho in prayer.

The other occupants of the canoe are an Indian guide and a voyageur, evidently one of Father Hennepin's companions on his famous trip. The red man is costumed in the usual Indian fashion, with leggings and moccasins. He has a paddle in one hand and with the other he holds to a large tree root to keep the canoe from drifting over the falls. The voyageur, the white man wears the regulation hunting shirt, long trousers and cap. The figures are almost life size and are arranged in a group of six. The hands and the wrinkles on the faces of the three men being brought out with great distinctness. A little to the left of the group is a group of the upper portion of the falls is visible.

Little Room for Criticism.
Over 1,500 pounds of butter are being utilized in Minnesota's dairy exhibit and in another case about 2,000 pounds of cheese from the dairies of the state will be shown. Three large mirrors have been placed at the back and on the two sides of the cheese display, so that it may be shown to the best advantage possible.

As a whole, there is little criticism to be made on this exhibit, now that it is completed. The butter statues do not represent the dairy idea as do those from some of the other states, but they illustrate an important fact in the history of Minnesota. They are original in design and conception, and the work upon them is among the best shown at the exposition. There was some delay in installing them, owing to the failure of the contractor to fit up the refrigerators earlier, but all the states have worked under the same disadvantage.

Displays of Other States.
Among the other northwestern states represented in the dairy exhibit are Wisconsin, Iowa, North and South Dakota. Wisconsin's display consists of a statue of a dairy maid attired in the typical costume of her class. She stands beside a cow and holds a pail in one hand. The sculptor was evidently not accustomed to handling animals, and he has not succeeded in making the cow look very lifelike; moreover the figures seem to be simply veneered with butter. Wisconsin is also represented by a model of the dairy school building of the Wisconsin university.

Iowa shows a model of the dairy school at Ames, while another section contains an old-fashioned churn and several miniature figures worked out in butter, showing the old process of churning. The group is good, the conventional in design, and the butter looks to be of excellent quality.

In South Dakota's section is to be found a beautiful exhibit of butter moulded into the shapes of different flowers. There are thirty-eight plates of these butter flowers in addition to two floral designs in relief. The work is very artistic, but it was a mistake to color the flowers, as the butter looks much better in natural shades. The exhibit of North Dakota is not yet ready for inspection. Its principal feature will be an equestrian statue of President Roosevelt. E. E. Coffman of Fargo is doing the work.

Out of 300 tubs of butter entered in the butter contest, sixty were from Minnesota. The next contest will take place July 15, the entries closing July 10.

Man Who Does the Work.
J. K. Daniels, who was retained by the Minnesota dairy and food commission to model the statues in butter for the fair, studied for four years in the St. Paul school of fine arts, afterward going to New York and working under the direction of Andrew O'Connor, the well-known sculptor of that city.

Mr. Daniels has made the butter statues shown at the state fair for several years. He also modeled the representation of the new state capitol which was exhibited by Minnesota at the Pan-American exposition. He is now at work on a group of butter statuary which will be the central feature of the agricultural exhibit.

After the completion of his work here he intends to return to Minnesota, leaving his brother, H. B. Daniels, in charge of both the agricultural and dairy exhibits.
