STAGG GRANTED A CONCESSION

"THREE-WEEKS RULE" IS COMPROMISED. Coach of the University of Chicago Hopes to Make a Better Showing as a Result of the Action of the Faculty—The Rule Explained.

New York Sun Special Service. Chicago, July 11.—Coach A. A. Stagg of the University of Chicago will have a fairer chance to develop his football team next fall than he has ever had in the past.

A troublesome law of the faculty, known as "Three weeks' rule," has been compromised. The compromise is considered to the advantage of the athletes who find it hard work to undergo the rigorous training of the field and at the same time remain high in their studies.

The "three weeks' rule" of the midday faculty, which for many years has been the bugaboo of the student body and which has been responsible for more demoralization and more maroon defeats than any other college policy, is in effect as follows:

"Any student who is reported by his instructor at the end of a three weeks' term as being below grade in his work, shall be ineligible for public appearance during the ensuing three weeks, at the end of the ensuing three weeks, he has brought his subject up to the required standard, he shall be eligible during the next ensuing three weeks."
