LOCAL POLITICS

COE OUTLINES HIS POSITION

WHAT HE WILL DO IF SENT TO CONGRESS

Says He Is a Protectionist, Favors Reciprocity and Is Against Trusts and Mergers—Campaign Thoroughly Organized—What the Secretary of His Committee Says.

William T. Coe, candidate for congress today made to The Journal a statement of his position. He said:

"For some time there has been a sentiment in this district in favor of sending a young man to congress. Relying on this and on the ample assurances of support which I have received during the past two months I have offered myself a candidate for the republican nomination. If nominated and elected I shall devote myself to the commercial, industrial and personal welfare of the whole people of the district. I will ally myself with the supporters of President Roosevelt in congress and do all in my power to aid him in carrying out the great purpose which he and the young American has for the advancement of civilization and the welfare of the republic.

I am a protectionist; I believe whatever revision of the tariff is made should be made by republicans, along conservative lines, altering only such schedules as are found out of adjustment with the conditions of the country. I am opposed to such a radical change in the tariff as would disturb the business of the country.

"I favor reciprocity; I believe in the extension of our markets, that more dollars may be put into the pockets of Minneapolis workmen, merchants and manufacturers. I am in favor of extending the relations of our trade relations with Canada along such lines as shall be mutually advantageous to both countries.

"Recognizing the evils of the great combinations commonly called trusts, which have become virtual monopolies, I stand for a national corporation law, in the firm belief that the recent merger decisions have shown, that the only power strong enough to control a billion dollar trust is a hundred billion dollar state. Congress has the power and ought to enact a corporation law analogous to the national banking act, which would prevent unfair charges to the people for the commodities of life, and prohibit profits to the promoter, give safety and security to the investor, stop the present unregulated state control, and give uniformly to the public the corporation law of the land."

Mr. Coe has a thorough organization already perfected. The following statement was made by Max D. Robb, secretary of his campaign committee: "I stand with a vast army of republicans in this district for William T. Coe for congress. He is honest. He is practical. He has proved a district as a ready debater and thoroughly equipped for a congressional career. His entire life has been such as to fit him most thoroughly to represent such a district as ours in congress. He is a graduate of the academic and law departments of the University of Minnesota and is a veteran of the Spanish war. Mr. Coe is thirty-five years old.

A PLACE FOR WARD
Minneapolis to Work With National Republican Committee.

Benjamin F. Ward, county oil inspector and republican worker, who during the pre-convention campaign, has been offered a position with the national republican committee, during the coming presidential campaign, and will doubtless accept.

In 1896 Mr. Ward was connected with the republican national committee, and worked directly under the late Senator Hanna. He was then engaged in "lining up" the Retail Clerks' association of Chicago and other similar organizations in the city. He was then employed this time also under the direction of the national committee-men in Chicago, and will make it his business to do his best to secure that during this campaign his energies may be directed towards organizing the voters in manufacturing centers.

PLEA FOR "REGULARS"
Veterans and Sons Asked to Support Only Them.
