VALUATION UP FIVE MILLION

THE CITY'S ASSESSED VALUATION WILL BE INCREASED.

The Larger Part of the Increase Will Be Made on Personal Property, Tho Real Estate Will Receive Something of a Boost—Equalizers Meet. Thru the work of the city assessor and the city board of equalization, the assessed valuation of Minneapolis will probably be increased by about \$5,000,000, raising the value of all taxable property in the city to about \$124,000,000.
