RUSSIANS RAGE OVER JAP TRICK

LOSS OF 30,000 ONLY A JAP HOAX

Story of Awful Casualties Spread by His Foes to Lure Kuro-patkin On.

Kuropatkin in Trap, Menaced by Three Great Jap Armies.

New York Sun Special Service. St. Petersburg, July 15.—It appears now that the dispatch reporting the loss of 30,000 Japanese was a miserable hoax of the Japanese themselves, suggested in order to mislead General Kuropatkin and to cause him to advance.

The consequent mortification and disgust felt has no limits. To make matters worse, according to the latest dispatches, General Oku is seriously threatening Niu-chuang with a large force.

KUROPATKIN IN TRAP

Three Jap Armies Threaten Czar's General and 150,000 Men.

Chicago, July 15.—Richard H. Little, Chicago Daily News staff correspondent, handles his paper from Niu-chuang as follows: "Kuropatkin, with his army of 150,000 men, seems in danger of being shut up in two or three days by the Russians as bewildered by the Japanese movements, which are swift and unexpected.

MERGER STOCKS TIED UP BY WRIT

COURT ENJOINS HILL INTERESTS

Distribution of Northern Pacific Shares Contributed by Harriman Forbidden.

Preliminary Injunction Is Granted in New Jersey, but Appeal Will Follow.

Trenton, N. J., July 15.—Judge Bradford today granted a preliminary injunction in the suit brought by Edward H. Harriman, Winslow S. Pierce and others to restrain the proposed partial distribution of the assets of the Northern Securities company.

The opinion is fifty typewritten pages in length. The litigation turned largely on the question as to the title of the Northern Pacific stock which E. H. Harriman and Winslow S. Pierce split into the combination and which amounted to about \$79,000,000.

ASTOR BETROTHAL ASTOUNDS LONDON

Bridegroom-to-Be the Butt of Society's Ridicule, Bride-Elect a Rich Beauty.

London, July 15.—The engagement of Pauline Astor to Captain Hugh Spender Clay caused utter astonishment in London society.

As brought out by the evidence, Neville argued that in 1893 he witnessed his signature to private family documents.

Entitled to Benefits. The judge also said that a preliminary injunction should be refused only where it was absolutely certain that the complainants could not obtain the relief which they were entitled to at a final hearing.

Followed Precedent. Judge Bradford asks that a form of decree be submitted to him. In granting a preliminary injunction the judge has not interfered with the policy that controlled Judge Kirkpatrick when the latter granted an injunction restraining the Pennsylvania from taking down the poles and wires of the Western Union when the company had been ordered to remove those poles and wires from the streets of Philadelphia.

Appeal Will Be Taken. Convulsive Bound in Union and Southern Pacific Stocks.

New York, July 15.—At the office of the Northern Securities company in this city it is said that President Hill would not say anything on the subject, at least until after he had the judge's decision on the matter.

Representatives of J. P. Morgan & Co. and of E. H. Harriman said they did not care to discuss the decision until their attorneys had read it in Morgan's office, however, that an appeal would be taken.

The announcement of the Northern Securities decision caused convulsive bound in Union Pacific to 95% and in Southern Pacific to 51%.
