CITIZENS OBJECT Citizens Claim That Viaducts Are Headquarters for Hoboes.

The viaduct which the Great Northern railroad purposes to erect at Twenty-third avenue SE, where the Como-Harriet car line crosses the tracks, has aroused much feeling among the taxpayers of Ellwell's additions. A mass meeting was held Wednesday evening at 1038 Como avenue to discuss the matter, and next Wednesday evening another meeting will be held at the same place.

The meeting was called to order by C. B. Moody. Mr. Gray was chosen chairman and D. C. Rugg secretary. The subject of railroad crossings was thoroughly discussed and it was the unanimous opinion that the residents in said district had been imposed upon. Two viaducts, one located at Tenth avenue SE and the other at Fifteenth avenue SE, are good illustrations of what can be expected from this kind of crossings.

Holdups are taking place even at midday. With another at Como and Twenty-third, this locality will become headquarters for hoboes, thugs and robbers until other parts of the city are treated to a dose of the same kind of crossings. At the time these other crossings were put in the people were assured that the expense of the same would be defrayed by the railroad company, but now they have the statement was merely a pretext to establish a precedent and put the taxpayers in a position from which they could not extricate themselves.

The real estate in the vicinity is only worth 40 to 50 per cent as much as it should be on account of the railroads and their crossings. The following resolution, which was unanimously passed, illustrates the sentiment of the meeting.

"Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting and of the property owners and taxpayers of Ellwell's and Glen Car additions that at the present time and under present conditions any change in the grade of the street at Como and Twenty-third avenues SE is not desirable, unless it shall be on the basis of lowering the railroad tracks and elevating the street." A committee of five was appointed to take charge of this matter and consult the roads and bridges committee of the city council and find out what steps have been taken toward making the excavation and to oppose it by all means, both rea-

sonable and legal; to forestall any effort which might further depreciate the property in this locality or injure the streets. The committee consists of Messrs. B. B. Moody, D. C. Rugg, Anderson, Gunderson and H. Pratt.

TO TRAIL ALGAE Minnesota Botanists Go West to Get Near Nature's Heart.

Under the tutelage of Miss Josephine Tilden, assistant professor of botany in the University of Minnesota, fifteen university students and instructors left yesterday for the Minnesota seaside botanical station, Vancouver island, British Columbia. They will spend their vacation in the seaweed and land plants around the island. On account of the humidity, fine microscopic examinations will be impossible, but careful study will be made of different varieties of flora. There will be general other parties at the station from other institutions. The work is under the general supervision of Professor Conway Macmillan.
