SHUT OUT TOLEDO IN CLOSE GAME

LENNON'S LOSERS COULD NOT HIT THOMAS.

"Fosty" Had Up Cold Wave Flag at Nicollet Park, but Made It Hot for the Visitors—McNichols Star Hitter of the Day—Coulter Won Game with a Single.

Mr. Lennon's syndicate team No. 2, of Toledo, furnished the blood for the making of a Roman holiday at Nicollet park yesterday afternoon. There was nothing much to it save that the mud hens came in and went out with the monotony of the creek of Fenimore and Spitzing windmill at Sauk Center. Thomas was in the box for Minneapolis and had the marooned ones sighing for a crack at the ball at last, they having lost all hope of hitting safely. But one hit was made by the visitors, that of Moriarty. A little pondering over the name will show just how and why he hit it. Being a sincere Irish ball player, "Moriarty" hit it. It was his birthright, that two-bag job.

Lundum was on the teeing ground for Toledo. He sliced and fozzled considerably, but he reached most of the time. McNichols had the advantage of him yesterday and made three hits of the six gained by the locals. Fox drew one of the little cushion and Maloney and Coulter divided what was left. The others also ran.

The nearest Toledo came to scoring was in the fifth inning, when Moriarty got loose a two-base souse on Thomas and went to third on a sacrifice by Brown. Burns bunted and Moriarty tried to score. Oyer threw him out at the plate. The locals started their fun to the first thing. "It was well they did. Willie Maloney, the Buster Brown of the miller family, started off with a two-sacker. Sullivan flipped his drive to the outfield and the potato patch looped under it, nipping Sullivan's ambition. Coulter demonstrated that when speed meets speed there's always something doing, and Maloney and Coulter on the ray of hope that Coulter's single opened up. After that Toledo snapped the cable and the Watkins harborboat couldn't have reached home with three tugs and a jackscrew. In the second inning McNichols singled and Fox followed with a repeater. Oyer's fly was absorbed by Lundum and applied to third base, cutting short the pilgrim's progress of the aspiring McNichols. After this incident Minneapolis did not get a man beyond second base. Moriarty at third didn't have any visitors and contented himself by singing come-all-ye's until the scoring sun went down.

The stands took wholesome delight in the discomfiture of Leo Moriarty. Afternoon Lee distinguished himself by two home runs. Yesterday afternoon he strode to the man with the air of Marc Anthony heading for Cleopatra and the pink teas. He rubbed dirt on his hands and spat upon them. He then cleansed his hands upon his shirt. He pulled down his cap, tucked his shirt inside his trousers, pulled up his knickerbockers, and waved the bat with the unction of a village undertaker at the funeral of the mayor of the burgh. His toilet completed, he faced Thomas prepared to knock the ball seven thousand feet.

He swung at one—and missed it. "See-c-o-r-r-i-k-o-one!" remarked Mr. Holliday. Another came by—disinited it. Same remark by the arbitrator. Mr. Lee was manifestly perturbed. He frowned in mighty wrath at the Lilliputian indicator holder.

He made two swipes like the arc of grandfathers' old-fashioned wheel sweep, while he was pausing to attempt to discern the telescopic knickerbocker "dead end" at him from the stands. Mr. Thomas sent a beautiful breaking "in" over the pan and Mr. Holliday extended him an invitation to take a seat in the far rear. His anger was apoplectic in its virulence and was not lessened by the chortling of the populace.



New York, July 20.—In jumping and running the Oxford-Cambridge team hopes to have a fair share of success against the Yale-Harvard men.

The Englishmen are all very strong in long distance running events and it is not likely that the Americans will win many points from them in anything pertaining to that kind of competition.

The above photographs show some of the English college men at their best in the dual meet between Oxford and Cambridge. Gregson, the Cambridge distance runner, who is president of the team, is particularly capable and probably will be a winner in the event in which he starts.

The high jumpers of both Oxford and Cambridge are competent and their form is particularly good, while Leach, the Oxford long jumper, is another clever athlete.

If the Americans should win it is believed that they will not be victorious by more than two points. The games will be held July 23.
