BONESTEEL UNDER REIGN OF RIOT

Gamblers and Thugs Rule, With the Authorities in Complete Submission.

Bonesteel, S. D., July 22.—Gamblers have won the day. In fact, the town has gone into partnership with the thugs, and wholesale robbing continues now under municipal supervision. Having been completely subdued in the reign of rioting and lawlessness, during which policemen were put to rout, clubs and disarms, and in which, with guns shooting, the grafters threatened to tear up the entire town, the authorities have given up all effort to rule the organized gang, and pickpockets and holdup men are running things more strongly than ever.

Last night Main street for a distance of four blocks was solidly packed with scores of flat-joint gamblers and every game a policeman stood guard to watch victims fleeced and to see that a sp was touched for more than \$2 at a sp.

The town board formally surrendered its authority to the grafters and admitted to them its helplessness. Riot arose when police attempted to stop shell games. The police force was kicked into an alley, shell games resumed and gamblers admittedly made rules of the town, and now every type of holdup game runs anywhere and everywhere, day and night, under official protection. The only provision is that no one is to be arrested, one spin exceeding \$2 on street games. Today a green policeman told a crowd of cappers to move on. "Go to the devil," snapped a capper, "we're running this and he took the officer's club and gun.

"We were forced to grant their demands," said Mayor Erb, "for we realize that if things went on Thugs are getting hungrier and desperate."

North-Western railroad officials in Norfolk are preparing for train robberies, fearing emergencies at any time. Banks in Bonesteel ship out all money every night. Forty holdups occurred today, and the man robbed by the sluggers became the work of sluggers as merely a matter of course. Police seeing pockets picked dare not touch the thief. In some instances they have arrested the man robbed for creating a disturbance.

A 14-year-old boy was nearly choked to death by two negroes, who robbed him of \$4. Women are in the game, leading victims into slummers' paths. More than 100,000 have started for the big lottery which registers next Tuesday. This gives one chance in forty.

WHAT WOMEN WANT TO KNOW

To Serve Melons Attractively.—Is there any way to serve melons so they will not look messy? My husband is fond of all kinds of melons, but I do not have them on my table as often as I might because I have never seen them served in a tempting fashion.—Mrs. P.

The fastidious housekeeper who objects to serving melons, giving as the reason that they are too messy for dainty service, is ignorant of the best methods of serving. A melon sliced and insufficiently chilled is unpalatable and awkward to handle, but ice-cold, with luscious pink flesh scooped out in dainty oval pieces or cut in neat squares and freed from the seeds, served on a pretty plate garnished with a spray of fresh mint, is a most refreshing and attractive dish. Another pretty method is to make a low melon basket of the shell, and fill it with the chilled fruit. Cut off the stem end of the melon, so it will set firmly on a large dish, making the handle on the opposite end. Remove all the edible portion, pick out all the seeds which can be reached without breaking the fruit too much, and set on the ice to keep cool. When ready to serve, set the cold crisp basket in a bed of crushed ice and ferns or any obtainable greens, fill the basket with the chilled fruit and serve at once. Tall glasses filled with the fruit cut in small pieces in a pretty and dainty manner of serving melons. Cantaloupes, muskmelons, as they are commonly called—should be scrubbed thoroughly with a brush free the netted skin from grit. Chill the melons, cut in half, remove all the seeds and fill the seed cavity with whipped cream. For luncheon, use a rich vanilla ice cream. Or the edible portion of the melon may be cut in neat cubes and served on a plate with a light sprinkling of salt.

RAILROADS.

VAST TERMINAL IN CHICAGO

Work on Immense Structure for Tunnel Company Begins Soon.
Chicago, July 22.—Work is to begin at once on the new terminal and storage plant of the Illinois Tunnel company, to be constructed on the dock property just purchased along the west side of the river, extending north from Taylor street. It probably will be the largest structure ever built for such purposes, being twelve stories and covering a ground space 404 feet wide and 699 feet long.

The building will be constructed five stories below the street level and seven stories above it. The floor on the street level will be a vast covered freight yard for the receipt and shipment of goods over the steam roads. In the sub-basement, fifty feet below the freight yard, tunnel service, more switch tracks and lines leading underground to every part of the business section of the city.

NEW LINE PROPOSED

Kallspeil-Whitefish Road May Be Built by Great Northern.
Kallspeil, Mont., July 22.—R. A. Wilkinson of St. Paul, chief right of way man for the Great Northern, is in Kallspeil in conference with Attorney Noffsinger of the Great Northern's legal staff. Mr. Wilkinson's visit is believed to be in connection with the proposed construction of a line direct from Kallspeil to the new town of Whitefish. Such a road would shorten the route of the Great Northern about 100 miles.

Although the new cut-off from Columbia Falls, Minn., is expected to connect with the Jennings branch, was originally estimated to cost the Great Northern the sum of \$1,500,000, the amount that has been expended upon this work to date, it is said upon the best of authority, reaches the enormous figure of about \$3,500,000, and the road is not yet close to completion. This is the section of road traversing miles of bog and swamp land, swallowing trainload after trainload of rock, with no sign yet of a permanent roadbed. Extensive tunneling is also necessary.

J. J. Struck, who has been in the general passenger department of the Soo line for a year, has been appointed assistant to A. J. Alcher, city ticket agent of the Great Western. A young man and new in the railroad business, Mr. Struck was offered the new position on account of his unusual ability.

RAILROAD NOTES.

Night and day crews are building the Great Northern twenty-six-mile extension between Grand Forks and Phenix, B. C. The company has 200 men at work, and expects to complete the line before snow falls.

Heavy travel to the annual industrial exhibition at Winnipeg is expected on account of the low rates advertised by the railroads. Railway officials of St. Paul have been invited to luncheon by the directors. Tuesday is the opening day.

The Omaha will run special trains from Dubuque, Ashland, Elroy and Hudson to Menomonie, Wis., July 30, for the annual convention of the Independent Scandinavian Workmen's association.
