**HOOK UP WABASH WITH MO. PACIFIC**

REPORT OF CONSOLIDATION FROM CREDIBLE SOURCES.

Russell Harding's Resignation as General Manager of the Latter Road Said to Have Hastened Gould's Decision to Couple Up the Two Big Systems.

St. Louis, Mo., July 28.—On authority that deserves the highest degree of credence it is stated that the Wabash and Missouri Pacific railroad systems are to be consolidated immediately upon the return of George J. Gould from Europe to September, and that Joseph Ramsay, Jr., president of the Wabash, is to become the president of the consolidated lines. The St. Louis capitalist and railroad broker who is the source of information, declares that the resignation of Russell Harding, vice president and general manager of the Missouri Pacific, has in a measure forced the immediate consummation of a project that Mr. Gould has long contemplated. The necessity for having a gilt-edged operating official, combined with the fact that Mr. Gould,

with his multifarious interests, has not the time to devote to the affairs of the Missouri Pacific that he would like to give them, is believed to have been the chief reason for the decision of the head of the Gould roads to carry into effect at once the long-cherished plan of consolidation.

It is known that Mr. Gould's counsel have been at work for some time on the legal problems presented by the scheme and it is believed that there will be little or no delay in consummating it after Mr. Gould's return and Russell Harding's retirement from the management of the Missouri Pacific.

**WHITEFISH MORE PROMINENT**

It Will Be Headquarters of Great Northern Cutoff.

Whitefish, Mont., is going to spring into prominence as division headquarters on the new Great Northern cutoff. Work has begun on the buildings. They are to be cement blocks. The "whitefish" investment company has been organized and will build fifty houses to rent to employees. J. H. O'Neil, division superintendent of the Great Northern at Kallispell, is president of the new company. George E. Baker of the Whitefish Lumber company is vice president; J. H. McCabe, a hardware merchant, treasurer, and Frank C. Paine, cashier of the Bank of Whitefish, secretary.

**H. E. BYRAM'S NEW PLACE**

He Becomes Superintendent of Dakota Division of Great Northern.

H. E. Byram, for two years assistant to the fourth vice president of the Rock Island, has been appointed superintendent of the Dakota division

of the Great Northern, with headquarters at Larimore, succeeding J. C. Howard, resigned.

At one time Mr. Byram was stenographer to James J. Hill and for sixteen years was assistant superintendent of the Cascade division of the Great Northern.

**SOO SEEKS DELAY**

Asks Court to Postpone St. Paul Crossing Work.

Upon application of the Soo line, an order to show cause has been issued compelling the board of county commissioners and Assistant County Attorney O'Neill of Ramsey county to appear in the Hennepin county district court and explain why they should not be restrained from continuing work on the new undergrade crossing at the intersection of the Soo tracks and Rice street.

The object of the railroad is to have this work discontinued until late this fall or next spring because of the company's inability to secure material for the bridge which has to be constructed as a complement to the work being done by the county for the undergrade crossing. The Ramsey county officials will fight the postponement. The order is returnable next Monday.

**COAL RATES INCREASED**

Action of Iowa Roads Said to Be Discriminatory.

Des Moines, Iowa, July 29.—All railroads operating between the Iowa coal fields and Missouri river points have given notice of an advance in rates effective Aug. 1 on coal shipments from Iowa. The shipments range from 3 cents a ton on lump

coal from Iowa points to Omaha and other Missouri river points, and from 14 to 23 cents a ton on nut and slack coal. Nut-coal rates have practically been reduced the same price charged on lump coal, while the advance on slack coal is to a higher rate than formerly charged on steam-coal shipments.

It is claimed the advance is an unjust discrimination against Iowa and in favor of the Pittsburg field, and especially in its application to the Kansas City market. The southern Iowa coal fields will be benefited in a measure, it is claimed, inasmuch as fuel will remain the same in Kansas City and St. Joseph, where they ship, while the northern fields will suffer in their shipments to Omaha, where it is claimed the cost of operating packinghouses will be increased about \$60,000 a year.

**TOTTEN LOTTERY NEXT IN ORDER**

NORTH DAKOTA RESERVE TO BE OPENED AUG. 8.

Registrations Can Be Made Either at Grand Forks or Devils Lake—East and South Expected to Send a Horde of Landseekers.

Special to The Journal. Grand Forks, N. D., July 26.—Preparations have been completed for the registration prior to the opening of the Fort Totten reservation. On the opening day, Aug. 8, government officials will be accessible at offices which will be fitted up in the Central school building for that purpose.

Advices from the east and south indicate that there will be a large crowd here at that time. An article bearing a Devils Lake date, published in several twin city papers, is very misleading concerning the matter of registration, and unless the error is corrected, many of the landseekers will be put to a great deal of trouble and inconvenience. This article says:

"It is true that registration for a few townships may be made at Grand Forks," and it is intimated that not many persons will stop off here. As a matter of fact, there is no such thing in connection with this opening as "registration for a few townships." No one registers for a particular locality, but

the registration is simply that the individual may be enrolled among those who have a chance in the drawing which is to follow. In view of the fact that this incorrect statement has been published, the conditions of settlement may be briefly summarized.

Registration begins at Grand Forks and Devils Lake on Aug. 8, and closes at both places on Aug. 20. It makes no difference where the registration is made. The several chances in one place are exactly the same as in the other. Each person registering will be required to sign a card, which is retained by the officials. After the registration closes, these cards will be collected and placed together in a box from which there will be drawn fifty each day until as many are drawn as there are claims to be filed upon. Successful persons will be required to make entry then at Devils Lake, but it will be observed that this has nothing to do with registration.

There will be an interval of two weeks between the last day of filing and the first day of the drawing, and it may be a month before any particular applicant's card is reached. Those who live in the state will register and return home until the time of the drawing, registering at Grand Forks or Devils Lake, whichever place is the most convenient to them. Those from a distance will be obliged to stay somewhere in the northwest to wait for the drawing, and many of them will prefer to remain at Grand Forks where there are ample hotel accommodations.

**DEVILS LAKE PREPARING**

Special to The Journal. Devils Lake, N. D., July 29.—Extensive preparations are being made to accommodate the prospective rush of landseekers to the opening of the Devils Lake Indian reservation. Cit-

sens appreciate that an immense amount of benefit will accrue from the large number of visitors attracted by the opening of the reservation, and realize that the better these visitors are cared for the greater the benefit to them.

The Chautauqua association, which has grounds in a short distance of the city, will place at the disposal of all who may come to register, their eatinghouses, hotels and numerous lodging places, in addition to placing 300 tents upon the grounds. There is an auditorium on the grounds, capable of seating 2,000 persons, which will also be used in housing the landseekers, should the occasion demand.
