Normannaheimen A BAUTA STONE FOR HANS HAUGE

NOTABLES ATTEND UNVEILING OF THE MEMORIAL
The Reviled and Persecuted When His Work Began, His Memory Is Now Revered by Loyal Norwegians Who Appreciate His Services to His Country.

A bauta stone to the memory of Hans Nielsen Hauge was unveiled on the Bretted, estate near Grørud church on July 24. The exercises were attended by Bishop Bang, Messrs. Hauge and Strugstad of the Norwegian ministry and many other notables. One hundred years ago the same class of people reviled, persecuted and even imprisoned the great evangelist who preached the gospel and quickened the spiritual activity of the country, sowing the seed for a revival whose effects are still felt. Hauge exerted a tremendous influence on his age, so great as to cause Georg Brandes to declare that altho Christianity was officially brought to Norway in the ninth century it was actually introduced in the nineteenth century by Hans Nielsen Hauge. Alexander Kjeliland, in a public address, said that Norway had never produced a greater man. He was born April 3, 1771. Beginning as a lay preacher near his home in 1796, he began his famous travels in Norway and Denmark two years later. He was arrested several times but released. In 1804, however, legal process was begun against him and he was in the next few years, most of which time he was imprisoned. He was fined 1,000 rigsdaler for violating the conventicle of 1741 and for his invectives against the priesthood. After his release from prison, Hauge was unable to travel but continued his evangelist work thru his writings. He died March 29, 1824, at Bretted, where he had lived for seven years. He had one son, the father of the present Hans Nielsen Hauge, of the Norwegian ministry. The bauta is a rough shaft of granite 21 feet high. One side is a relief portrait of Hauge and a quatrain from his writings from a design modeled by Rev. Erling Gronland.

SCANDINAVIAN MUSIC

A Special Program Announced for the Harriet Pavilion.

The Scandinavian program, to be given at the Lake Harriet pavilion next Thursday evening, is arousing great interest among the Scandinavian people of the twin cities. The Norwegian program of last week was such a pronounced success and drew forth so many requests for repetition of at least a part of the program, that Mr. Oberholfer arranged to accede to such request. As might have been anticipated, the "Remembrance of Grief," which aroused such intense enthusiasm on the occasion of the former concert, is to be repeated, with the "Peer Gynt" number, the "Solvi's Lied." The "Summer Day in Norway," by Willmers, with its wealth of descriptive composition will also be played. The "Swedish Song" singing in the tops of the pines, the play of the waterfalls, the old church hymn, the national dances, and the "Angelus," calling the people from pleasure to their homes.

Another feature of the new program, which, by the way, includes composers from all the Scandinavian countries, is the fantasia, by Max von Lenz, upon the Scandinavian folk-songs, called "In the Viking's Boat." Into this number many of the familiar airs of the fatherland have been woven with consummate skill. The program will contain many other large numbers.

SWEDEN'S PEACE ENVOYS

Distinguished Men Will Attend the Peace Congress at St. Louis.

Sweden's representatives to the international peace congress to be held at St. Louis are Bishop K. H. G. von Scheele, Count Raoul Hamilton, Hugo P. P. Tamm, Ernst Beckman, and Johan Olson. These have been appointed by King Oscar and the riksdag, of which several of them are members. Bishop von Scheele has visited this country on two previous occasions as the special representative of the church of Sweden and King Oscar to Swedish people in America. Count Hamilton is a member of one of the most influential families in Sweden, a family which has long been in the country with many notable warriors. Mr. Tamm, who by the way is married to a Chicago woman, is a millstone manufacturer and large land owner, and besides belongs to a fine old family and is a distinguished economist. In the riksdag he is a liberal and invariably heads the finance committees, which is not at all due to the fact that he is the wealthiest man in the country.

INDUSTRIAL SWEDEN

Much Wealth Produced in the Cities—Their Records.

As in all other respects, Stockholm leads the cities of Sweden in the number of industrial plants and the value of output. Strange to say, Gottenburg is third, not second, this honor going to Malmo. Norrkoping is fourth in rank. In Eskilstuna every fourth inhabitant is a factory hand, and the same ratio prevails in Trelleborg. In 1903 the industries of Sweden produced goods to the value of over \$20,000,000 kr. The lumbering interests produced 48,900,000 kr. and the iron mines yielded ore to the value of 16,825,164 kr. Immense quantities were shipped to England, the United States, Germany, France and Belgium.

MORE NORWEGIAN IRON

Chr. Anker Prospecting Rich Fields in South Varanger.

Prospecting has been going on ever since the snow left the ground in South Varanger, Norway. The work has been prosecuted under the direction of Chr. Anker, who has all the necessary means for developing and leads which should be located. Iron ore has been found in immense quantities—veins being from thirty to forty meters in length and their course traced for several miles. There is a general hope in the country that the fields will be developed as soon as possible.

WOODS IN EUROPE

Only four of the countries of Europe can export timber from their forests, these being Sweden, Norway, Russia and Austria. Forty per cent of the area of Sweden is still in forest, and 21 per cent of Norway, while in Great Britain, for instance, the percentage is only 4.

MINISTER QVAM IS DEAD

Ole Anton Qvam, formerly Norwegian minister of state at Stockholm, died tonight ago at Stenkaer, Norway. Hr. Qvam was born at Molde, Aug. 5, 1834, and after a college course took up the

Recognize Berne Convention.
In conformity with the agreements of the Berne convention, Sweden hereafter will not permit translations from the works of foreign authors without their consent until the expiration of ten years after the date of publication.
Reformer Alberti.
Hr. Alberti, minister of justice in Denmark, is preparing a law for ridding the country of immoral women. If the riksdag will pass the law he will attend to its enforcement himself. Minister Alberti is apparently not afraid of defeat, altho his law for the re-establishment of the whipping post brought him much censure and loss of prestige.
Many Railways in Sweden.
Sweden boasts of having more railroads in proportion to the number of inhabitants than any other country in the world. It has 23.3 km. per 10,000 inhabitants. Denmark is next, with 12.7. Switzerland has 12, and France 11.5.
Wedded Fifty Years.
David Swensen, formerly a member of the Norwegian storthing, celebrated his golden wedding on July 19, at his summer home on Snar Island, near Christiania. Hr. Swensen, who served two terms in the storthing, was well qualified for political life, but absolutely declined re-election in 1873. He was a successful agriculturalist and manufacturer.
A Danish Mandarin.
Albert Nielsen, a Dane by birth, who entered the Chinese naval service seven years ago as third lieutenant, has recently been appointed a mandarin of the fourth class. He is the under-director of customs at Canton.
Why Import So Much?
