

### HAMMOND DENIES HIS PAL CHRISTIE

NORTH DAKOTA NOT IMPORTANT, HE SAYS.

When Captured at Spokane He Made a Full Confession of His Own and Christie's Connection with Bearmouth Robbery—Story of Valuable Papers Scouted.

Special to The Journal. Helena, Mont., Aug. 5.—George Hammond, the confessed Bearmouth train robber, when informed of the arrest of his alleged partner at Hope, N. D., said that the officers might have got Christie, who associated with him before his arrest in Spokane, but he was positive that they did not have the man who was his partner in the Bearmouth robbery. Asked what had become of the man who held up the train, Hammond said he had gone to Canada. This was all he would divulge about his partner, saying that he had never played traitor yet, and would not "squel" now.

He then went on to say that Mr. McFetridge of the Northern Pacific had brought identification papers for him to sign as to a description of his partner, but he had refused to do so. When told that some diamonds had been found on Christie, Hammond said he did not believe a word of it and, further, that he did not believe he had been captured at all.

Hammond then spoke of his own case, saying that G. M. Nethercutt, a lawyer who had been sent to him by Officer Burns, one of the men who arrested him, had taken everything Hammond told him to the officers, thus learning much more than they would have otherwise.

Hammond said that he and his partner had cashed paper worth over \$100,000 to the Northern Pacific, and that the officers would not receive it until Hammond had received his sentence and if he got the limit they would never get it.

W. J. McFetridge, special agent of the Northern Pacific, said: "After Hammond was arrested in Spokane he made a full confession to the officers and acknowledged that Christie was the man who helped him hold up the train. The valuable papers Hammond claims to have are not worth 60 cents, being canceled express orders."

David A. Cory (rep.) was today appointed county commissioner to succeed the late Colonel Hundley (dem.). The law provides that county judges shall appoint in case of a vacancy. The judges being opposed politically could not agree and drew lots, Judge Smith securing the choice and naming Mr. Cory.

### LEADERS WORRY OVER MR. BRYAN

His "Support" Hurts More Than It Helps—He Will Campaign for La Follette.

By W. W. Jermans. Chicago, Aug. 5.—Mr. Bryan's attitude toward the democratic national ticket is causing the Chicago leaders great worry. They know that Bryan has said he would support Parker, but that isn't sufficient, in view of some of the moves the "cheerless leader" is making and some of the things he is saying.

Lately the Chicago democracy conceived the idea of having a big blow-out here, by way of a formal campaign open to all, with Bryan and Parker as the drawing cards. They were to speak from the same platform, and the brand of harmony thus produced was to increase the leaders' aforesaid materially. A committee was sent to Esopus, and another to Lincoln, Judge Parker "balked." It has been learned that he purposed following the "front porch" campaign methods so effectively used by McKinley at Canton in 1896. Mr. Bryan didn't balk—but the Chicago leaders did, after they heard the report of their committee.

"Mr. Bryan will come," said the committee, "and he will make a speech in favor of Judge Parker, but he also informs us that in the same speech he will attack our state ticket and the Springfield convention." So the big blow-out will not be graced by the presence of either Parker or Bryan.

Mr. Bryan has made no Chautauqua lecture engagements beyond Aug. 31, and announces that during the last two months of the campaign he will hold himself in readiness to stump the country under the aegis of the democratic national committee. Just what under the committee will make of him, and where, however, is very much of a question. Bryan says he will not be a "front porch" speaker, but he does some work in Wisconsin for Governor La Follette, a republican.

In the meantime, the Commoner continues to stand up for Parker, at the same time saying that his nomination was a mistake and was accomplished by fraud.

These are some of the things about Bryan that are worrying the Chicago faithful and causing them to wonder if it wouldn't be better to have Bryan were this year to come out into the open for Roosevelt.

That the net result of Bryan's attitude is to make votes for Roosevelt is generally admitted. Unfortunately, however, so far as the republicans are concerned, these votes, or the most of them, will be cast in western states, which Roosevelt will carry anyway. His campaigning, therefore, does not promise to affect the electoral vote in any way.

It is likely that thousands of Bryan men in the old free silver states of the west will this year be for Roosevelt—not at Bryan's behest, so much as because they know Roosevelt and like him, and stand for what he is doing, now that silver is no longer an issue. Bryan knows this, and will not do anything to change it. It is apparent that he does not want Parker elected, and that his campaign attitude will be one of formal regularity, quite unmarked by earnestness or heart interest. In other words, he will stand where many eastern democrats of the Gorman school stood in 1872, when which isn't a bad idea, for it is a poor rule that won't work both ways.

This attitude of Bryan men in the silver states is expected to influence the result in such states as Colorado, Idaho and Montana, which the democrats think are debatable ground this year. It is likely that the campaign will carry Nevada, of which there may be hope before election day, it will be responsible for that result, also.

It is likely that the sinking of Bryan democrats in New York, Connecticut, New Jersey and Indiana, the campaign wouldn't have half the interest it now promises to have.

**REAL HISTORY OF PARKER TELEGRAM**

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Now that is all over and no harm has been done, republicans and democrats are free to admit that there was a situation somewhat resembling a panic in republican circles for a short time after the Parker telegram to the St. Louis convention. This feeling even reached Oyster Bay, but it is all gone now. The reaction is now in full swing, and the republican managers are beginning to figure that the famous telegram has done Roosevelt more good than harm.

Obviously, the moral value of the telegram would have been heightened and made permanent had it been sent before the nomination, instead of afterwards. It has been reliably informed of the circumstances which led up to its being sent at all. Judge Parker was in close touch with the convention from beginning to end. He was in Chicago on the Saturday morning of the convention. The platform had been adopted Friday evening at the beginning of the famous all-night session. Parker knew at breakfast Saturday morning just what the situation was, and yet he did nothing until after the arrival at Esopus of the morning New York papers. The World served editorial notice that morning that Judge Parker could not hope to carry New York on the platform adopted. The Times, the Sun and the Herald talked in the same vein. At once Judge Parker was face to face with a real situation. His silence up to this hour had shown that he had no particular fault to find with what had been done. But without the support of the newspapers referred to, he could not hope to carry New York, and without New York he could not be elected. So he went for a horse-back ride, to think it over. Upon his return he found August Belmont on the phone from St. Louis. Belmont advised a telegram to the convention. Parker did some more thinking, and the telegram was sent. It was a direct concession to the New York newspapers, whose support he knew he must have.
