NO SUBSTITUTION IN DODGE CASE

CASE AGAINST LOCAL ATTORNEYS IS DISMISSED.

Supreme Court Holds that Evidence of Bad Faith Was Not Conclusive—Justice Douglas Files Dissenting Opinion, Declaring the Charges Proved.

"Order to show cause discharged." This is the conclusion of the supreme court in the disbarment proceeding against W. E. Dodge and Vernon W. Dodge, the Minneapolis attorneys. The decision was handed down today.

The proceedings were begun by the state bar association, represented by E. L. Southworth on information furnished by the claim department of the Great Northern railway, for which W. E. Dodge was formerly attorney.

The court concludes that the circumstances were very suspicious, but that the evidence was not entirely conclusive. In a case of such character more than a preponderance of evidence is required.

NEW OCEAN TO OCEAN RAILROAD

CANADIAN LINES MERGED—CONNECTIONS TO BE BUILT.

Plans Filed at Ottawa for Road from Quebec Thru Maine and Canada to Country Harbor—Negotiations for Purchase of Several Links.

Special to The Journal. Ottawa, Can., Aug. 5.—A system of railways which, when joined together, will form a continuous stretch from the Rocky mountains to the Atlantic coast, was consolidated today.

This afternoon plans were filed with the railway department for building the Quebec, New Brunswick & Nova Scotia railway from Quebec thru Maine, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia to Country Harbor, 105 miles east of Halifax.
