DRESSMAKERS OF PARIS IN TRUST

Models of New Gowns Will Be Kept From Foreign Eyes Till Sept. 15.

Paris, Aug. 11.—All the principal dressmakers of Paris have joined in a trust of an altogether new kind, it being nothing more or less than a trust of feignance. The members of the new combine include such well-known names as Arand, Deg, Calot, Cheruit, Duost, Douillet, Lafriere, Redfern, Rouff and Randnitz. For many seasons past the German and Austrian dressmakers have been buying the best models from big Paris houses and then selling at a reduced price copies of these models to second-rate houses all over Europe and America. As a result, when the genuine client of a Paris dressmaker had bought a high-class original it was often merely to find on returning home the same model already produced by wholesale.

Complaints have been filed, and to offset this a trust has been formed. Members of the new organization have decided to show none of the new models to foreign buyers before Aug. 16 and to deliver no models to the continental trade before Sept. 15. American buyers, however, may have their models one week earlier.

MISS HULL, NOT MISS TREADWAY

CONGRESSMAN'S DAUGHTER TO CHRISTEN THE DUBUQUE.

Mayor of the Iowa Town Procrastinated Beyond All Precedent and the Honor Goes, by Warrant of Secretary Morton, to Miss Annette Hull of Des Moines.

New York, Aug. 11.—Following the invitation of Miss Annette Hull of Des Moines to christen the new United States gunboat Dubuque at the yards of Charles L. Seabury & Co. in Morris Heights, her acceptance of the invitation, a new development, which somewhat complicates the trouble in finding a sponsor for the vessel, has arisen. When Mr. Seabury wrote to Secretary Paul Morton asking him to appoint some one to stand sponsor for the Dubuque, Morton forwarded a letter to Mayor Berg at Dubuque, asking him to select some young woman in that city for the honor. Mayor Berg, after a search, answered that he was unable to find any one, and it began to look as if the Dubuque would be forced to become an unbaptized infant in the navy. Mr. Seabury later was authorized by Secretary Morton to invite any one he chose. He selected Miss Hull, whose father, Representative John A. T. Hull, is a member of the executive committee of the republican congressional committee.

Miss Hull, who is living with her father and mother at the Waldorf-Astoria, accepted. Yesterday Mayor Berg notified Secretary Morton that he had selected Miss Margaret Treadway, daughter of the president of the Dubuque club, as sponsor for the vessel. Miss Treadway might have had the honor but for the procrastination of Mayor Berg. As it is, Miss Hull will be the sponsor.

WHAT WOMEN WANT TO KNOW

Biting the Lips.—Thru nervousness I have acquired the habit of biting my lips, and if you can tell me of anything that will cure me I shall be so grateful?—Jean.

Poets and artists sing of "the light that lies in woman's eyes," but everyone will agree that even a plain face is redeemed by a well-shaped mouth, which, next to the eyes, registers clearly the varied moods of the human face; it behooves women, therefore, to make the most of this feature. Having formed the habit of biting the lips from nervous excitement or any passing emotion, only some determined effort on your part can overcome the habit. If continued it will surely make the lips thick and coarse. The reason for this is obvious. The pressure and kneading motion of the teeth on the lips act almost exactly like massage and particularly so if cold cream is applied to allay any irritation of the skin; then you have the whole process of massage and the index is inevitable. To avoid self-consciousness which might result if you attempted to think of the fault continually, dab the lips with some harmless bitter solution to act as a reminder. Quinine is suggested; dissolve two grains of quinine in a small phial of water and apply with a brush or bit of cotton; dab some on the index finger nail, which you nibble when perplexed. Continue the application daily until the habit is broken.
