Miss Hull, however, feels that the honor belongs to Dubuque, and she has graciously withdrawn her name only after she had understood that no Dubuque girl wanted the distinction.

## WHAT WOMEN WANT TO KNOW

Pimples on the forehead.—What can I do for my forehead as it breaks out in painful red blotches? I can drive them away for only a few days at a time and although I am very healthy I have had this trouble since last winter.—Jennie.

The large red pimples on the forehead which come and go at intervals may be due to indigestion or to an oily skin; as you say your health is perfect the trouble is probably due to an over oily skin in which case persistent cleansing to free the closed pores will effect a cure. Be careful to avoid any foods which are likely to incite indigestion, such as pickles, sweets, pastry, soda water, etc., and do not overheat the blood by too violent an exercise, although moderate exertion will induce a full flow of perspiration and this should be followed by a hot tub bath to assist in clearing the complexion. Twice each day morning and night, the face should be thoroughly washed with very warm water and plenty of sulphur soap, obtainable at any drug store, and rinsed in cold water to free it from suds and to tone up the relaxed complexion. Use a wash cloth, lather well and rub the soap on thoroughly, reaching up in the edge of the hair as well as over the entire face and neck. Dry the face with a soft towel, and avoid irritating the blotches. Prepare the following sulphur lotion which is most efficacious in obstinate cases of pimples, and bathe the forehead and especially the pimples several times each day, applying with the finger tips after pouring the needed quantity in a clean saucer for each application. In two or three weeks you should notice a decided improvement. The formula is as follows: One ounce of precipitated sulphur, one-half drachm camphor gum and two ounces each of best alcohol and water. Dissolve the camphor gum in the alcohol, then add the sulphur and sulphur, let it stand for twenty-four hours and it is ready for use.

## SEE A NEW TRANS-CONTINENTAL CUT

### IOWANS THINK HILL'S LITTLE GRADE MEANS MUCH.

Extension South from Minot Taken to Portland Bee Line Northwest Bringing Sioux City 400 Miles Nearer Puget Sound—Prestigious Effect on Minneapolis.

In a projected Great Northern extension from Minot, N. D., to Bismarck, Minn., residents of Sioux City profess to see the first evidence of a new transcontinental cut-off with Sioux City as an important gateway. Fifty-two miles of the line south from Minot have already been graded and the plan is to have steel laid to Bismarck before snow flies. According to the local idea, that the line will ultimately be extended on thru Aberdeen and Huron to Sioux City, bringing that city 400 miles nearer the Puget Sound country than now. Further speculation carries the line to St. Louis, creating a new transcontinental line of large proportions.

While the tangible evidence of this vast scheme is nothing more than a paucity fifty-two miles of grading, there are possibilities in it that will cause Minnesota shippers to await further developments with interest. When the anti-merger agitation was young, intimate associates of J. J. Hill were eloquent regarding what he had done for the twin cities and, incidentally, conveyed the idea that he had it in his power to nullify whatever commercial advantages these cities enjoyed. No one would suppose that Hill, discharging revenge to the extent of building a thousand miles of new road, but it is a fact that ever since he acquired the line, he has been laying wires to build up St. Louis as an east and west gateway. He has taken into consideration the deep water possibilities by river and gulf and has frequently expressed the keenest interest in that fact that he had gained entrance to so promising a traffic center. In fact, he was talking in most sanguine fashion of St. Louis' commercial future, long before the Northern Securities merger was launched.

What the Madison-St. Louis Falls Survey May Mean.

Sioux Falls, S. D., Aug. 15.—In view of the announcement from Madison that a corps of Milwaukee surveyors will be here this morning, it is probable that the city to Sioux Falls, the developments of the near future promise to have considerable bearing on railroad construction in this part of the state. If it proves true that the Milwaukee intends building a line thru the territory in which the South Dakota territory is now being surveyed, it may result in the new company, which had intended constructing a line from Minneapolis to Sioux Falls, and leaving it out of its future calculations.

It is believed in some quarters that the line of the Central Railroad company will encourage and support the building of the new line by the South Dakota Central, with the ultimate object being to build a proper and thus extending its own line farther into South Dakota.

## PRESIDENT ELLIOTT'S TRIP

Six Weeks' Tour over the Northern Pacific—Senator Allison in Party.  
President Howard Elliott of the Northern Pacific says that the inspection he has just finished was the most enjoyable trip of his life. It lasted six weeks and was taken in the daylight. All branches of the Northern Pacific were inspected. Senator W. B. Allison of Iowa, Charles E. Perkins, formerly president of the Burlington, and General C. F. The wheat will be larger and better than last year. A great deal of time was spent west of Rocky mountains in the state of Washington where the wheat crop is very good and is practically assured."
