

SHALL PYTHIANS ADMIT SISTERS? Burning Question Before Supreme Lodge in Session in Louisville.

Louisville, Ky., Aug. 16.—The supreme lodge, which is the business department of the Knights of Pythias, opened its sessions here today. Among matters of interest was a proposal for changing the password annually instead of semi-annually.

The lodge will also be called upon to settle the relation of the endowment rank to the regular lodge. Many enthusiastic knights feel that the Knights of Pythias is a fraternal order rather than an insurance organization, and that the endowment rank should be eliminated.
