

PULLED OUT OF THE HOLE BY A FROST CARE WHEAT ORDERS APPEAR EARLY

Jones Says the Manitoba Crop Will Not Total Over 42,000,000 Bushels. With Possibility That It May Not Exceed 35,000,000 Should Frost Come.

Canadian Reports of a Bullish Tenor From Other Sources Also.

Minneapolis Chamber of Commerce, Aug. 25.—Wheat went lower at the opening this morning and apparently touched bottom around \$1.05 1/2 for December, but there was quick rebound from that point and prices were up 3c all around in a short time.

The surprising news about today's advance was the fact that it occurred in the face of the most bullish foreign markets seen in many a day. Liverpool was down 2 1/2d and Antwerp 1 1/2d, Budapest 3/4c, Antwerp 5/8c, and Paris 3/16c.

Receipts here continue light, only 125 cars turning up today, against 284 a year ago. Duluth wired: "The tradist is satisfied there is a large part of our crop which cannot be used for flour at all, but will have to go for feed."
