## ARMY OFFICERS' SNUB FOR CORBIN

High Rank Members of General Staff Shun the Army Maneuvers.

Washington, Aug. 29.—The army maneuvers at Manassas will not be an affair of pomp and pageantry. The high officers of the general staff of the army will not appear on the field on which Major General H. C. Corbin is expected to cover himself with glory. The light of the countenances of Generals Chaffee, Ainsworth, Gillespie and Storey will not fall upon the general who for so many years was the actual if not the titular head of the army.

army organization have not forgiven Corbin for the severity with which he ruled them while he was exercising the functions of adjutant general. They do not like what he did then or what he is doing now, namely, getting himself ready to have his friends claim the chieftaincy of the general staff when Chaffee retires. When it was first proposed that he should succeed Chaffee, his critics called attention to the fact that the new headship of the army was intended to be filled by a line and not a staff officer, and that Corbin had never commanded anything more than a skeleton brigade during the civil war and never more than a battalion after that period. They set down as axiomatic that no man who had done less than command a department could be made chief of staff. Accepting that standard of performance as authentic, Corbin asked for his present command and then the command in the Philippines. The general will start for the far east on Oct. 1.

## GIRLS AND ONE-LEGGED MAN WIN IN SWIM

New York Sun Special Service. New York, Aug. 29.—Thirty-two swimmers, members of the Volunteer Life-Saving corps, and two young women, engaged in a long-distance swimming race from the Brooklyn bridge to Coney Island, twelve miles, yesterday.

The two girls, Miss Eleanor Webster of Flatbush and Miss Flora West of Brooklyn, proved themselves to be more than the peers of all but one of the male contestants, and he had but one leg. One after another the contestants gave in until only six remained. Several of them were so exhausted that they had to have medical attention. The race was won by Charles Soffred of Coney Island. The remarkably good condition of the girls, after so long stay in the water was commented upon.

## PACKERS REJECT STRIKERS' APPEAL

Application Made for Peace Parley—Labor Leaders Fight Stampede.

Chicago, Aug. 29.—Application was made to the packers by the stockyards strikers today for a conference, the purpose being to bring about peace in the industrial conflict waging at Packingtown. The conference was refused by the packers. The application came in the form of a communication from the allied trades council, and was signed by President Harr of the Allied Trades. The request was sent immediately after the close of a joint meeting of the national executive board of butcher workmen, and the allied trades conference board, and was addressed to J. Ogden Armour and his associates. Mr. Armour upon receipt of the communication at once called the heads of the other big packing plants into session. When the meeting of the packers ended, a communication was addressed to President Donnelly and his associates, declining the conference the strikers had asked for. The reason given was that no good could come from such a conference.

With the strike relief funds depleted and crowds of hungry men vainly scrambling for food at the commissary stores, it taxed the labor leaders to find a way to prevent a stampede from the union ranks to the packinghouses to-day. "Wait until to-morrow and we shall present to the packers a peace proposal which they cannot decline to accept," they told the men. "There is nothing left for the men but unconditional surrender," said a packer. "The leaders should not hesitate in calling the strike off so that the men who are anxious could find work. Many of them will be rehired in Packingtown, but there are thousands who must look elsewhere for employment and they should be released so they can begin their hunt for work outside the stockyards. It does not make any difference what peace proposal the strikers have to submit—we shall not deal with the unions. The only terms of surrender we shall consider will be the return of the men as individuals." The packinghouse teamsters will meet to-night to discuss the advisability of declaring the strike off, so far as they are concerned. George J. Goldstein, president of the union, said that they would refuse to contribute any more to the support of the 20,000 strikers.

## CONGRESSMEN TOUR BIG RIVER

Party Filling Two Boats Reached the Port of Dubuque Last Night.

Dubuque, Iowa, Aug. 29.—The members of the congressional rivers and harbors committee arrived in the city last evening on the steamers Colonel McKenzie and Louisiana, on a tour of inspection of the Mississippi. The party was met a short distance up the river by Mayor Berg and a committee of citizens and escorted to the city. They were tendered at luncheon at the Dubuque club and among the guests were Mayor Allison and former Speaker Henderson.

Winona, Minn., Aug. 29.—The congressional committee on rivers and harbors arrived at Winona at a delightful day on the river and was met by a large delegation of Winona's representative citizens and heaviest ship-pers. Carriages were in waiting at Riverside Park, and the members of the committee were given a drive about the city. A favorable incident, and one which could not fail to impress the members of the committee with the importance of the upper river traffic, presented itself as the party drew to shore at Dubuque. There were no fewer than eight boats, either at the levee or in sight. Only one stop was made on the trip down, that being at Lake City, where the mayor, C. A. Hubbard.
