Five of Their Children and a Large Circle of Friends and Relatives Join in Celebrating.




MR. AND MRS. JAMES GRIFFITH OF GRAND FORKS.

Accurate Measurements Taken by a Simple Photographic Process—Practical Tests Made by Eastern Houses.



NEW MEASUREMENT SYSTEM DEvised BY WISCONSIN TAILOR.

Special to The Journal. Ladysmith, Wis., Sept. 5.—Gerhard Moe of this city, has perfected and brought into practical use an apparatus that is at once unique, practical and useful. His invention is an apparatus for the taking of various measurements of the human body thru the photographic process, from which cutters and garment fitters may perform their work without the necessity of taking measure, and with the contour of the figure to be fitted always before the eye.

First—A plain background with diagonal lines. Second—A common camera fitted with a screen so constructed as to produce squares of desired size upon the face of the picture produced. Third—Bands placed around the body at points usually measured by tailors.

PUMPING WATER ON BENCH LANDS

ANOTHER IRRIGATION SCHEME IN THE MISSOURI COUNTRY. Newell, Chief of the Reclamation Service, and Chandler, the State Engineer, will tour the River North of Bismarck—Fire in Capitol Causes Scare at Bismarck.

Special to The Journal. Bismarck, N. D., Sept. 5.—F. H. Newell, chief of the reclamation service of the United States geological survey, and Professor E. F. Chandler, state irrigation engineer, are in Bismarck, the guests of President E. A. Williams of the State Irrigation association. Mr. Newell has his first opportunity to see the bench lands along the Missouri river, which are believed to be capable of irrigation thru pumping water from the river.
