


10,000 KNIGHTS TEMPLAR PARADE

POPS WON'T LET FLAME GO OUT

WILL HOLD STATE CONVENTION HERE SEPT. 23.

Call for Meeting Sent Out by Chairman Lawson—It Will Be a Parlor Conference—Electoral, and Possibly a State Ticket, Will Be Named.

Minnesota populists will put a Watson and Tibbles electoral ticket in the field to keep alive the sacred flame. It is just possible that the ticket will also be named, but that is a matter to be determined at the state convention, which will meet at the Nicolet hotel, Minneapolis, Sept. 23, at 7:30 p. m.

The call for this meeting has been issued by Victor E. Lawson of William, chairman of the state committee, and R. W. Stanford of Minneapolis, secretary. The representation is fixed on the vote for Thomas J. Meighen for governor in 1902, and delegates are allowed the various counties as follows:

UNION IN HENNEPIN. Girling's Prediction as to Post-Primary Republicanism.

"By the time the primary election is over, I believe the republican party in Hennepin county will be solidly united for every candidate on the state ticket," said Chairman Girling of the county republican committee this morning.

Several thousand letters are being sent out by Loren Fletcher's campaign managers to every man it is believed can be induced to participate in the good work for "Uncle Loren." His record is recited as a reason why he should be nominated. It is asserted that during his service in the army he was awarded \$2,500,000 for the establishment of the rural free delivery service in Hennepin.

WILLIAMS' PLATFORM. Democratic Candidate for Congress Stands on Nine Planks.

W. H. Williams, democratic candidate for nomination as congressman, has announced a platform of nine planks: Government ownership of the telegraph; election of judges by direct vote; postmasters to be elected by the citizens they serve; unrestricted trade with Canada and abolition of the tariff on trust-made goods; enforcement of criminal laws against trusts, their officers and promoters, the same as against petty criminals; eight-hour day and abolition of contract system on all government work; non-interference by federal courts in domestic disputes between labor and capital; same treatment for the Philippines that we gave to Cuba; the Panama canal is a good thing for the west.

JAPAN IS FLOURISHING

RICE CROP ENORMOUS AND TREASURY IN EXCELLENT CONDITION.

New York, Sept. 6.—S. Uchida, Japanese consul in New York, received today the following cablegram from Y. Sakatane, vice minister of finance at Tokio: "Rice crop exceedingly good. Nearly \$5,000,000 koku above the average. The money market being easy, 10,000,000 treasury bills will be issued tomorrow (Sept. 7). In order to encourage savings, the industrial bank of Japan will issue 5 yen premium debentures for savings. The total of the amount of postal savings as of Sept. 3 showed an increase of about 4,000,000 yen over the same date last year."

Consul Uchida says this cablegram shows a most encouraging condition of affairs in Japan, and he thinks it to mean that, notwithstanding the war, his country is flourishing financially, industrially and commercially.

The main Japanese army is marching up along the roads eastward of the Russian lines of retreat, which converge at Mukden. Another Japanese force is also heading for Mukden from the west.

ward, coming from the direction of the Liao river. Marshal Oyama seems to be making a race for Mukden. He evidently has great superiority in numbers, especially in artillery.

The retreat of General Kuropatkin's army is being carried out in good order, despite the terrible condition of the roads, rendered sodden by the rains which fell yesterday and today and which mire the lumbering guns and heavy transport trains. Long lines of commissariat wagons, drawn by steaming mules, horses and even bullocks, are straining their way north over the soaking cut-up main road from Yentai. Behind them come long trains of artillery and pack of long trails, Kuropatkin's army.

The Japanese are hanging on Kuropatkin's flanks, keeping the Russians engaged in a continuous rear-guard action. The progress of the retreating army has been slow owing to the necessity of first getting thru the baggage and guns; but the heads of the commissariat trains already have passed thru Mukden and are continuing their way north.
