NORTH-WESTERN'S EARNINGS
Report Shows Increase in Minnesota Business.

The annual report of the North-Western road, filed with the state railroad commission, shows earnings from local and interstate business in Minnesota to have been \$3,006,804.37, an increase of \$101,000.22. Earnings from business originating and terminating in Minnesota were \$1,025,732.75. Earnings from business other than transportation were \$8,996.97 for the state and on interstate business were \$4,191.46. The gross earnings for the road were \$53,362,166.88, and the operating expenses were \$55,543,136.76.
