CLEARING THE STREETS

Thorofares to Be Bidded of Rows of Trolley Poles.

The street railway company has asked the city council to pass a resolution providing for the removal of a large number of trolley poles from the center of the street to the side. The resolution desired is to include Western avenue from Hennepin to Penn avenue; Twentieth avenue N from Washington to Penn avenue; Plymouth avenue from Washington to Lyndale avenue; Emerson avenue from Twenty-sixth to Thirty-second avenues N; Laurel avenue from Great Northern railway bridge to Cedar Lake road; Bryant avenue S from Thirty-first to Forty-sixth streets; Nicollet avenue from Thirty-eighth to Fifty-fifth streets; Washington avenue SE from the river to Twenty-fifth avenue SE; First avenue S from Washington to High street; High street from First avenue to Hennepin.
