### WHAT WOMEN WANT TO KNOW

By Marion Olcott Prentice. Washing Blue Embroidery.—Kindly let me know how to wash a white cotton shirtwaist trimmed with blue (young) cross-stitch embroidery.—Young Matron.

Blue is classed as a fugitive color unless of the shade of the old-time indigo or delft, but with care its usefulness may be prolonged for an indefinite period. Apply water, yellow laundry soap, sunlight or heat from a hot iron while the article is wet, and prolonged moisture are the greatest enemies of the color. To set the color in your blue embroidered white waist of cotton, dissolve two rounding teaspoonfuls of fine table salt in a quart of cold water and soak the embroidered parts in the solution for half an hour. Prepare a moderate suds with tepid water and white soap dissolved in hot water and strain it into the tub. Bring the embroidery free from brine, rinse quickly in clear cold water and plunge into the suds. Wash at once but do not rub. Rinse in cold water, and squeeze directly to such parts. If much soiled, squeeze the water rapidly thru the fabric until clean. Rinse in two clear cold waters then in blue water and hang in the shade to dry. Always select a day when the wind blows briskly to facilitate the process of drying. While the still damp, be sure walk in any embroidered part, press with only moderately hot irons. Lay the embroidery face down on a rather thickly padded ironing board, always ironing on the wrong side with heavy pressure, which will bring the needlework out beautifully.

## GOULD LINE TO COAST

TRANSCONTINENTAL TRAINS EXPECTED TO BE RUNNING SOON OVER THRU SYSTEM.  
New York Sun Special Service.  
Chicago, Sept. 13.—It is predicted that, as result of the negotiations upon which the election of President E. T. Jeffery of the Denver & Rio Grande to the directorate of the Western Pacific railway, the Gould system will be running thru trains within two years from Baltimore to San Francisco.  
By the affiliation of the Gould system and the Western Pacific the 800-mile gap which barred the Gould lines from the Pacific ocean has been closed.  
While Mr. Gould does not appear as the actual owner of a majority of the Western Pacific's stock, his interest in the property is said to be large enough to make his influence dominant, and it will, to all intents and purposes, be a Gould road.
