ORDERS WEDDING STOPPED BY WIRE

Wife of Rogers of Omaha Interferes When He Leads Another to the Altar.

Special to The Journal. Omaha, Neb., Sept. 15.—W. H. Rogers, a prominent business man here and president of the Hawkeye club, the leading social organization, and Miss Naome Spencer arrived today to be married. When they stepped from the train they were informed by a policeman that Rogers' wife in Chicago had telegraphed an order to stop the marriage. The bride-elect turned pale and glanced at her husband-to-be suspiciously. Mr. Rogers, who has been divorced from the Chicago woman. Since they had no order from an officer, the Omaha police decided they could not prevent the marriage and it is expected to take place as arranged. Mrs. Rogers stated in her telegram that her husband had no divorce, but that if he had obtained a decree it was by fraudulent means and she had instructed Sioux City attorneys to proceed to set it aside. Because of her affection for him, Miss Spencer is determined to marry Rogers, even if it should result in a charge of bigamy.

BADGER BULL WINS PRIZE

ANIMALS OWNED BY EASTERN MILLIONAIRES OUTCLASSED AT ST. LOUIS BY THE NORTHWEST.

St. Louis, Sept. 15.—Flying Fox's Poxhall, Thomas W. Lawson's entry in the class for aged bulls at the world's cattle show yesterday, could get no better than sixth place, and the nominations of George Vanderbilt and the Ladd estate, the other millionaire competitors in the Jersey events, were not in the money.

Merry Maiden's third son, owned by H. C. Taylor of Oxfordville, Wis., was the animal that lowered the colors of the heads of the millionaire herds. The winner is a descendant from Brown Besie, who won first prize dairy tests at the Columbian exposition. Mr. Taylor values him at \$10,000.

ARRAIGNS BOTH PARTIES

NEGRO CANDIDATE FOR THE PRESIDENCY ESPECIALLY HOSTILE TO REPUBLICANS.

Des Moines, Iowa, Sept. 15.—George E. Taylor of Ottumwa county, presidential nominee of the national liberty party, arraigns both democrats and republicans in his letter of acceptance, and holds the latter especially responsible for the failure of the negro to get full civil recognition. He accuses the republicans of having betrayed the negro, while holding out false inducements to him. He appeals to the negroes to stand their ground, and insists in that way alone can they get full recognition of citizenship rights.

SEVEN MILES AN HOUR

Trolley at Lincoln on the Old Horse-car Schedule.

Special to The Journal. Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 15.—Beginning today the maximum speed at which Lincoln street cars can run is seven miles an hour, and many people prefer to walk. The change is the result of a fight between the city administration and the traction company because of the abolition of passes for policemen. The latter resurrected an unrecalled horse ordinance limiting street cars speed and demanded its enforcement.

RAILROADS

AFTER TRAFFIC IN N. W.

PENNSYLVANIA SHOWS INCREASED INTEREST IN TERRITORY BY APPOINTMENT OF NEW AGENTS.

New York Sun Special Service. Chicago, Sept. 15.—The management of the Pennsylvania railroad has decided to reach out for increased passenger traffic in the northwest, and with this end in view has appointed several new agents in the large cities. Appointments thus far announced are:

G. J. A. Thompson, chief clerk in the office of the general passenger agent at Chicago, to be traveling passenger agent in the northwest, with headquarters in the twin cities.

F. A. Baughens, formerly city passenger agent at Toledo, to be city passenger agent at Milwaukee, where the Pennsylvania has had no representative.

A. W. Arnold, formerly traveling passenger agent in the northwest, appointed city passenger agent at the twin cities, a new position.

It is understood the Pennsylvania will make further appointments in the northwest with a view of increasing its proportion of the passenger traffic in that territory.

GETS SUPERIOR OPTION

Some Company, Name Unknown, Gets Footing in the Lake City.

Special to The Journal. Superior, Wis., Sept. 15.—The real start in securing land for the new railroad from Mankato, thru Kasota, St. Peter, Ottawa, Sharon, Dresselville, Thomas, Lawrence, East Union, Carver, Chaska, Hazeltine, Waconia to the shores of Lake Minnetonka at Minnetonka Heights, thence skirting the shore thru Upper Lake Park, Birch Bluff, Excelsior, Deephaven, Bay St. Louis and to St. Louis Park. This line would be eighty miles long. There would be six or more trains a day each way on a running time of about two hours. The Mankato-St. Peter line, twelve miles long, must be in operation Sept. 1, 1905. Right-of-way is being located and surveyors are laying out the line.

MANKATO TO FLOUR CITY

Colonel Hord Talks of Route for New Trolley Line.

Colonel U. P. Hord of the firm which has the trolley franchise from St. Peter to Mankato has given a rough outline of a possible extension to Minneapolis as follows: From Mankato, thru Kasota, St. Peter, Ottawa, Sharon, Dresselville, Thomas, Lawrence, East Union, Carver, Chaska, Hazeltine, Waconia to the shores of Lake Minnetonka at Minnetonka Heights, thence skirting the shore thru Upper Lake Park, Birch Bluff, Excelsior, Deephaven, Bay St. Louis and to St. Louis Park.

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NEW G. N. BRANCH TO OPEN

Line From Columbia Falls to Jennings to Be Ready Oct. 1.

The Great Northern will open its Kalispell cutoff from Columbia Falls to the Jennings branch Oct. 1. The track is now being ballasted. The most important new town is Whitefish, which will be division headquarters. It has a population of 1,000, gained in a year. The town formerly on the main line will now be in the branch.

EDITOR RECOVERS MILEAGE

Circus Man Gives Great Western Official a Surprise.

H. C. Hesser, editor of the News at Somers, Iowa, has received the unused portion of a Great Western mileage book, which he lost while at the Barnum & Bailey circus at Fort Dodge. It is good for 750 miles. W. R. Macdonald of the circus wrote that the book was picked up on the grounds. Mr. Hesser returned the unused portion to the road and General Advertising Agent Greve at St. Paul was as much surprised at the return of the mileage by the circus as was the management of the same circus to receive the surplus of a fund left with the Minneapolis health department for the cleaning of the circus grounds after the departure of the circus.

FAVORS TUCKS INLET

President Hays Thinks It Good for G. T. P. Pacific Port.

Winnipeg, Sept. 15.—Word comes from Victoria that President Hays' return has returned to the government steamer Quadra from its four-month inspection of the British Columbia coast to select a terminal port for the Grand Trunk Pacific. It is said that Mr. Hays is greatly impressed with the suitability of Tucks Inlet, a harbor about twelve miles south of Port Simpson, and which is better to be much easier of access by rail from the east than is the water front of the latter port.

ROADS SHOW DEFICITS

Minneapolis & St. Louis \$103,291 Behind for Last Year.

Reports of the St. Louis and Iowa Central roads show a deficit of \$103,291 for the St. Louis and \$88,219 for the Central in the last fiscal year. The gross earnings of the former road were \$3,024,111 and operating expenses \$1,218,177. Of the Central the earnings were \$2,400,000 and operating expenses \$1,917,086, or 79.56 per cent.

Bridge Is Under Way

Onnagon, Mich., Sept. 15.—After considerable delay in securing material the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad company has commenced work on the construction of its proposed bridge across the Ontonagon river. In thirty days, it is expected, trains will be running over the structure. The bridge will be of three spans, 440 feet in all with an approach of 75 feet on the Ontonagon village side of the stream.

Contract Comes This Way

Special to The Journal. Munising, Mich., Sept. 15.—A contract to build three additional miles of roadway on Grand Island, off the coast at Munising, in Lake Superior, has been awarded by the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company to Marshall & Sherman, general contractors of Marquette and Minneapolis. The work will cost \$10,000 and is to be done this year. Grand Island is the big granite preserve of the Cleveland Cliffs company.

Block System Completed

The Omaha's block system from Chippewa Falls to Superior has been completed. Thirty-nine towers have been installed. Ninety-six-pound rails have been laid from Chippewa Falls to Eagle Point.


RAILROAD NOTES


