FAIRBANKS WILL TALK FROM TRAIN

VICE PRESIDENTIAL CANDIDATE IN MINNESOTA TOMORROW.

He Will Make Several Rear-Platform Speeches on His 300-Mile Tour, Addressing a Big Meeting at St. Paul in the Evening.

Senator Charles W. Fairbanks, republican nominee for vice president, will make a rear-platform tour thru southern Minnesota tomorrow, on his way to the Pacific coast. The Fairbanks special train is due at La Crosse, Wis., at 7:30 a.m. tomorrow. From there it will proceed over the Southern Minnesota division of the Milwaukee. Fifteen-minute stops for speeches will be made at Rushford, Lanesboro and Spring Valley, with longer stops at Austin and Albert Lea. The train will then run north over the Rock Island, stopping at Owatonna, Faribault and Northfield, and arriving at St. Paul in time for a rest before the evening meeting. This meeting will be held at the People's church in St. Paul, and the other speakers will be Senator Dolliver of Iowa, Senator Clapp and R. C. Dunn.
