THE WEATHER The Predictions. Minnesota—Showers and probably thunderstorms tonight and Wednesday; warmer in east portion tonight; variable winds.

BOARD OF TAX LEVY HEARS ITS REQUEST Controller Rogers Will Require \$366,671 for Interest on Bonds—Washburn Park Residents Petition for Improvements to Cost \$10,000—Hard Job for the Board.

The New Structure Will Occupy the Site of the Old Main Building, Burned Last Week, but Will Be Larger and Safer—The Northrop Reception.

Twenty-five Per Cent of the Pupils in the Four Schools Taking the New Course—Some Enter It from Other Departments.

Weather Conditions. Cloudy weather is reported over large areas in the lake region, middle and upper Mississippi valley and the Ohio valley, and there is clear weather on the south Atlantic, gulf and south and middle Pacific coasts.

Listening to tales of want is still the occupation of the board of tax levy. Improvements are asked everywhere, and on the other hand, there is a demand for a low tax levy.

President Cyrus Northrop and Judge Greenleaf Clark, representing the board of regents, had an extended conference with the state board of control this morning in regard to the best method of facing the predicament in which the university has been placed by the loss of the old main building.

The commercial course of study introduced at the Minnesota high schools this fall is proving a great success. It is being taken by a large percentage of the students entered this year, and is doing much towards making the high schools the more popular with young men.

This morning's session of the annual assembly of the Minnesota Knights of Pythias marked the beginning of a hotly contested fight to determine whether the grand tribunal shall be continued. The tribunal determines the qualifications of members who have engaged in the occupations prohibited to members, such as liquor dealing, gambling, etc.

The East Side's Wants. City Engineer Andrew Rinker discussed the estimates for permanent improvements this morning together with the request for two new engine houses and a police station for the East Side area as follows:

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Soo Earnings Reports.—The report of the Minneapolis Paul & Sault Ste. Marie road for the third week of September shows gross earnings of \$213,372. This compares with \$144,486 in the corresponding week of last year and is a gain of \$68,886, or 47.6 per cent.

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Intoxicated Man Burned.—A man was found wandering near Hennepin, near Fifth, this morning and taken to the city hospital, where it was found that he was drunk and suffering from severe burns on both arms. He gave his name as Roy Bixby. The wounds were dressed and the man was sent to the police station.

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Great Northern Lake Trains.—The Great Northern has maintained its Minnesota service this year later in the season than ever before and the travel has been gratifyingly large. However, beginning Oct. 1, the midday trains will be taken off except on Saturdays. These two trains now leave the lake at 1 p. m. and the city at 2 p. m. The schedule will stand otherwise as it is now.

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Fugitives May Be Here.—Sheriff J. W. Dreger last evening received a telephone message from Pine City informing him that all breaking and entering and travel agents in that place and asking him to keep a lookout for two young escaped prisoners, Fred Arnold and Charlie Howe. Four men escaped, but two of them were recaptured. The other two are supposed to have headed for Minneapolis.

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Kindergarten School Approved.—Miss Stella Louise Wood, director of the Minneapolis Kindergarten Association Normal school, has just received a letter from the state board of education of California which states that at a recent meeting of the board the school was placed on the accredited list of kindergartens. This means that graduates of the school are eligible to a position in California without an examination, a distinct triumph for the school.

MR. OUTRAM'S SUMMARY He Tells How the Work in the Fields Progresses. T. S. Outram, section director of the weather bureau's climate and crop service, in his weekly review of Minnesota weather and crops, issued today, says: The early part of the week was cooler than the latter part, with frosts general in the northern half of the state on the 20th, 21st and 22d, and in exposed places in the south. Light rains occurred in the middle of the week in central and northern portions, and at scattered southern points late in the week. In the northern half of the state the frosts have killed all the tender vegetation and injured considerable corn fodder, but in the southern half, where most of the corn is grown, a good deal of the corn is safe, and much of it is already in shock; the late corn will hardly mature, and will probably yield only soft corn or fodder.
