LARGE CROWDS HEAR FAIRBANKS

TWO MEETINGS IN BUTTE LAST NIGHT.

Miners Flocked to the Rally at Anaconda Where the Candidate Discussed the Panama Canal Question—School Children a Noticeable Part of Livingston's Welcome.

Butte, Mont., Sept. 28.—With a speech at Anaconda last evening, and two in this city last night Senator Fairbanks closed his second day in Montana.

Stops for speeches were made at Big Timber, Livingston, Bozeman and Whitehall. At all of these places except Bozeman practically the entire population turned out to welcome the presidential candidate and his associates, and the exception at Bozeman was caused by a misunderstanding of the time of arrival.

At Livingston the school children were marshaled for special display and formed a noticeable feature of the day.

The Panama canal question was among the issues discussed at the Anaconda meeting by Senator Fairbanks.
