WOMAN'S WORLD

CLUBS AND CHARITIES WILL MEET IN FARGO

Women of Minneapolis Branch Plan Their Annual Gathering.

The women of the Minneapolis branch are making great preparations for their annual meeting to be held this year in Fargo, N. D., Oct. 14-17. The meeting will be attended by representative women of the Methodist church from Minnesota and the two Dakotas. The presence of two missionaries just returned from the field will add to the interest of the occasion. One of these, Miss Ella Blackstock, has long been at the head of the Harrison Industrial school in Tokio, Japan. This school was the gift of Mrs. William Harrison of London, Ontario, and is very high as a training school for young women. Its work last year was awarded one of the two highest prizes given by the Ladies' Fine Art society of Tokio.

Other pleasant features of the convention will be the reception given for the ladies by the people of Fargo; the addresses of the corresponding secretary, Mrs. Isaac Joyce and of Mrs. B. E. Long of St. Paul, who will speak on her trip to Jerusalem. The corresponding treasurer is looked for with great interest. Last year the branch raised over twenty-five thousand dollars.

WESTMINSTER WOMEN

Kindergarten and Industrial Society Hold Its Annual Meeting.

For twenty years the women of Westminster church have carried on their industrial and kindergarten work in Minneapolis, and the annual meeting Wednesday afternoon in the church parlors was held with interest. Mrs. George H. Miller was in the chair and Mrs. W. F. Ladue conducted the opening exercises. The report of the treasurer showed that the receipts for the year were \$1,705.50 and the expenditures leave a balance of \$157.15.

Mrs. Susan K. Morse, director of Riverside kindergarten, reported that there are 170 mothers coming to the Mothers' club. The women are supplied with work and seven have been sent to the Northwestern hospital free of cost. Mrs. Eloise Shrock stated that the new building of Hope mission was well adapted to kindergarten work and that the mothers' meetings are well attended. Mrs. E. F. Ramsey, industrial teacher at Hope mission, reported an attendance of 200 girls and 50 boys. She spoke of the need of teachers as the lack of leaders sadly cripples the work.

The relief committee has distributed 712 garments during the year and 85 pairs of jelly slippers. The program was adopted. Rev. J. E. Bushnell congratulated the women on their work at the close of the reports.

The election of officers resulted in the following choice: President, Mrs. W. O. Wolford; secretary, Mrs. E. D. E. Smith; treasurer, Mrs. E. J. Moles; auditor, Mrs. J. R. Gordon; vice president, Mrs. George H. Miller; E. S. Williams, W. O. Winston, J. S. Porteous and Clerihew; chairman of kindergarten committee, Mrs. Harriet Weir; chairman of the relief committee, Mrs. Charles Godlev. A social hour followed the example of business and mimes, J. R. Gordon and J. S. Porteous presided at the refreshment tables.

The Needlework Guild.

The Needlework guild of the Authors' Study club planned to show its annual collection for the Minneapolis branch of the Needlework guild at two receptions at the home of Mrs. J. A. Brant, 12 E. Fifteenth street. The first took place this afternoon from 3 until 5 o'clock and one-half of the club members aided the hostess in dispensing hospitality. The splendid collection was arranged on tables thru the rooms and was constantly inclosed by the packages brought by the contributors. The Authors' Study club was the first literary club to take up the work of the Needlework guild as an organization, and since then the Cassiopeia and Bunches have followed its example. Frappe was served during the afternoon and the rooms were bright with asters and sweet peas. Tomorrow afternoon the second reception will be held and the guests will be the women who are interested in the work of the guild, whether they are club members or not.

The Needlework guild will begin Monday to make its annual collection of new garments for the city charities, and the section presidents have been elected to bring their contributions to the Church of the Redeemer as early as possible.
