WATKINS WILL NOT QUIT MINNEAPOLIS BASEBALL MANAGEMENT.

On the Contrary, He Will Close Out Business Interests in Indianapolis Preparatory to Making This His Home—He Talks of His Intentions of Next Year.

"There is no truth in the story that I intend to desert Minneapolis baseball to return to Indianapolis," said Magistrate W. H. Watkins this morning.

"There is no use staying here now. The people are not in the mood to give me a fair trial. I am glad to give way. The two seasons dovetail nicely in Minneapolis.

"Next year I purpose to give Minneapolis fans as good a ball team as any in the association. I was obliged to start off with some dead timber last spring, which I did not get out of the way until too late to get into the season.

"So far as I can tell, the team of 1905 will be called together at Champaign, Ill., for early training.

"There is a good plant there, and I hope to get the boys into the game in good shape and make a fight from the start.

"Minneapolis has treated me well, and I wish to express my gratitude to the baseball loving people for the support they offered in my first year. Those who followed the team closely know what we were against. It is my desire to make Minneapolis the best ball town in the American northern circuit, and with a good team it will be that.

"No, I am not quitting Minneapolis. I have too much invested here to throw it away capriciously, and will spend my winter in trying to build up a faster and better team than I had this year.

Miss Severson was passing the Loren Fletcher house at Second avenue S. and Tenth street at 8 o'clock when two young men grabbed the handbag she carried. The handles were of soft leather and wrapped around her wrists.

"The jewelry loss is heavy, but consists only of small trinkets and one or two old bracelets. The more expensive jewels were locked in a safety deposit vault downtown.

The thieves departed as quietly as they came, leaving the door open. The loss was not discovered until 10 o'clock and it is thought to have been done by the same men.

The loss is fully covered by the Fred L. Gray company.

This burglary is similar to the robbery of the E. N. Saunders residence in St. Paul last Wednesday night, when \$10,000 worth of silver plate was taken.

The police officers of both cities are working on the case.
