SCIENTIST DEAD OF X-RAY BURNS

Young Associate of Edison Falls Victim to Prolonged Laboratory Experiments.

New York Sun Special Service.
New York, Oct. 4.—Clarence E. Daly, a young electrical engineer, lies dead in his home at East Orange, a martyr to science. His death resulted from experiments with Roentgen rays. For seven years he endured terrible suffering and underwent seven operations, losing both of his arms. He died yesterday.

Daly was burned by X-rays in passing his hands thru the rays. His disease attracted the attention of medical men throughout the country. His brain was active until within a few hours of his death. In his experimental work with the X-rays Daly was Thomas A. Edison's chief assistant, and worked at the laboratory in West Orange, night and day. It was necessary to use many chemicals in experimenting with the fluorescent before the desired formula was hit upon. Edison himself was burned with these chemicals, but Daly, who had most of the experimenting to do, sustained more serious injuries. He suffered no pain from these burns, but his hands looked as though they had been scalded.

their pleasant relations ever been disturbed. When Mr. Cortelyou came to Chicago the last time he and Mr. Tawney both thought it would be well for Mr. Tawney to come to New York to go over the work of assigning speakers with Senator Scott, chairman of the eastern half of the speakers' bureau, so as to prevent duplication of work and waste of time. Mr. Tawney came, had a long talk with Senator Scott, and then walked into Mr. Cortelyou's office unannounced, was warmly greeted, went with Mr. Cortelyou to dinner, and finally returned to Chicago. His surprise equaled Mr. Cortelyou's when he read the World stories.

These are merely samples of what the New York democratic press is doing in the way of a personal attack on the republican chairman. The chairman can stand it if the Parker candidacy can. Scattered thru New York and the east are many democrats who were devoted to President McKinley, for whom they voted twice, and to Senator Hanna, his "great lieutenant," as Mr. Root called him at the Chicago convention. These men know that Mr. Cortelyou was very close to both McKinley and Hanna, who gave him their friendship and confidence. They know without investigation that these personal attacks are not founded in truth, and they will not grow wildly enthusiastic in support of a candidate in whose interest they are made.

The exigencies of the democratic

campaign in this state no doubt call for heroic measures. Democratic prospects again threaten to sag. They showed signs of improvement immediately after the publication of the Parker letter of acceptance, just as they did after the gold telegram, but only for a brief period. The sagging will be more pronounced when the Higgins speech of acceptance, made today, reaches the voters, for Mr. Higgins does not wear any Odell collar, and that his election will not mean the perpetuation of Odell's control at Albany. He thus answers every argument against him for he is a man of high character, established reputation, and eminently fitted for the office of governor. There is as much difference between him and Judge Herrick, his opponent, as there is between Mr. Cortelyou and Mr. Taggart.

The tide has been running against Higgins to Herrick until the state republicans have been badly frightened. Sometimes a fright in politics is a good thing, for it sets men to work. This is what it has done in New York state. It has solidified the republican forces and sent them forward with a grim determination. While this strenuous exertion is under way, the Higgins speech brief acceptance helps greatly to the drift will now be in the republican direction.

Cortelyou's Baffling Silence.
The democratic press has hoped that Mr. Cortelyou would take public notice of its attacks, replying in authorized interviews or signed statements. After each attack the newspapers sent reporters to national headquarters to ask him what reply he purposed making. Great was their chagrin when he replied that he would have nothing to say. The chairman knew full well that by replying he would place himself upon the defensive and open wide the gate to an irrelevant discussion that would divert attention from the real issues and the real candidates. It is the plan of the republican leaders to focus attention on Judge Parker and Judge Herrick in this state.

PARTY STRIFE IN FINLAND CEASING

Peasants and Workmen Declare Against Partisan Campaign for Elections.

Helsingfors, Finland, Oct. 4.—The inhabitants of Finland are busy with the elections to the forthcoming diet. It is already evident that the days of strife between the Swenomen (old) and the Finns (young) parties are numbered. The peasants and workmen have declared against a partisan campaign.

The peasant electoral colleges are selecting delegates instructed to choose delegates who are free from party trammels and pledged to vote for the development of railroads, the extension of temperance and the preservation of forests.

The workmen are disappointed with the Swedish young Finnish party and were at first inclined to entirely abstain from the election, but a meeting of labor delegates at Helsingfors has just decided by 64 against 29 to participate on a strictly non-partisan basis voting only for deputies pledged to promote the interests of labor.

The election campaign is not restricted in any way by the authorities.

RAILROADS

ELECTRIC ROADS ARE IT

MANY BRANCH LINES WILL FEED FAR WESTERN ROADS NEXT YEAR.

Short electric roads for the hauling of freight will be a feature of new railroad building in the west next spring. About a dozen following the irrigated valleys will be built in Washington and Idaho alone. Water power will be used generally in making the electric current. Some of the roads planned are: From Colfax to Palouse City, twenty-four miles, then to Princeton, Idaho, with a branch to Viola, opening a hay and timber territory; a road twenty miles long running thru Sunnyside, connecting with the Northern Pacific at Prosper; from Spokane to Medical Lake, fifteen miles long, midway between the Washington Central and the Great Northern; from Spokane to Oshawa and Moscow, 100 miles; from Tacoma to Olympia.

MERGER ROADS CONNECT

Line Between the Roads Being Surveyed at Red Lake Falls.

Red Lake Falls, Minn., Oct. 4.—A party of Great Northern engineers arrived here yesterday and are at work surveying a line connecting the Great Northern with the Northern Pacific at this point. Right of way has been secured and it is reported that the work will be done this fall. This will make the Great Northern a main line.

NO FEAR OF RUSSIA

Tramp Steamers at Tacoma Loading with Railroad Supplies for Japan.
Two tramp steamers are loading rails at Tacoma for Korea for the completion of the Japanese military railway between Seoul and Miju. They are the Norwegian tramp steamer Hero and British tramp steamer Inverness.

Captain Svendsen of the Hero does not believe the Russians will attempt to intercept the rail ships. His ship is chartered by Americans, and the rails will be delivered to an American company. The Hero will run no more danger than any of the regular orientals lines.

ALTERNATE OPERATION

Rock Island and Union Pacific Take Turn About with Alton.
Chicago, Oct. 4.—Under a compromise effected between the contending factions for the control of the Chicago & Alton, the road will be operated alternately for two-year periods by the Rock Island and the Union Pacific interests. It was supposed there would be a sharp fight for control at the annual meeting. It developed, however, that under an agreement entered into between the divergent interests, harmony will reign.

HAD TO RUN FROM FIRE

Railroad Men in West Flee from Fierce Burning Forests.
Forest fires in British Columbia forty-five miles from the Canadian Pacific branch which runs to Spence's Ridge cut short a vacation of G. H. MacRae,

CONFIRMS THE STORY

Duluth Report Shows That Wisconsin Central Is Building at Lake Head.
Reports from Duluth confirm the Journal story that the Wisconsin Central, or the company which now owns it, is buying the trackage thru the center of Superior and is making the surveys for an air line in northern Wisconsin. It is well-known that the crews make their report direct to the president of the Wisconsin Central, and that the regular engineering force of the road has no knowledge of what is going on.

Switching Question Unsettled.

Developments in the flour switching row are slow. The millers have not paid charges under the advanced schedule, recently made by the switching companies. The millers regard the charge of \$1.50 a car as fair, but refuse to have anything to do with the tonnage charge which has been levied against the one product, flour and millstuffs.

Lemon Rate Cheaper.

Reduction in the lemon rate from the coast to the Mississippi valley will save growers or the consumers several hundred thousand dollars. The harvest promises to reach 4,000 cars, an unusual crop. After Nov. 11 the rate will be \$1 a hundred pounds instead of \$1.25. A temporary rate of \$1 expired June 15.

St. Paul Board of Trade charges against Great Western rates on South St. Paul business will not be heard for two weeks because of injuries to C. F. Staples, member of the state railroad commission.
