INDEPENDENT REPUBLICANS ARE IN OPEN REVOLT.

Protest Against "Bossism" Emphasized by the Nomination of a County and Legislative Ticket—Nominees for Legislature Pledged to Ballot Reform.

Marquette, Mich., Oct. 8.—As a rebuke to bossism independent republicans at a convention held here yesterday afternoon, put a county ticket in the field as follows: Judge of probate, Charles Kelsey, Marquette; sheriff, August Swanson, Ishpeming; treasurer, Warner Nikander, Negaunee county; clerk, William Ross, Marquette; register of deeds, James Roberts, Ishpeming; assessor, T. M. Wells, Negaunee, and J. H. Mortley, Ishpeming.

Robinson, Sr., attempt to murder, ten years, Marquette prison.

Special to The Journal. Duluth, Minn., Oct. 8.—Fall schedules, arranged between the various interests, indicate a movement of iron ore from the Duluth, Mesaba & Northern, the Duluth & Iron Range and the Great Northern, all Minnesota ores, amounting to 13,000,000 to 13,500,000 tons for the year.
